

BLOOD WORK BY ORIENTAL REBELS.

Female Missionaries Brutally Attacked at Heman.

A TERRIBLE FIRE NEAR YOKOHAMA.

TWENTY LIVES LOST BY AN EARTHQUAKE SHOCK.

Over a Thousand Houses Destroyed and Fifty More Damaged by Fire and Water-British Steamship Ordered to Interfere Unless the Hostility to Foreigners is Stopped.

Vancouver, B. C., July 5.—The Empress of China brings news from Corea up to June 12. Since the arrival of Japanese troops nothing of importance has occurred. Japanese papers are under close censorship.

On the 22nd ultimo, there was a rumor to the effect that 10,000 Chinese troops were entering Corea from Yuen. Five Chinese men of war are anchored off Gumbong, Chullado. The Japanese minister to Corea has refused the request of Mr. Yuan, Chinese resident at Seoul and of the Korean government, to withdraw the Chinese troops from Corea. The government forces have recovered Zenshu and the insurrection has been almost suppressed.

There was a rumor in Shanghai June 11 among the natives trading with Corea and Japan, that Viceroy Li had received secret instructions from the throne to send 6,000 foot soldiers and 1,500 cavalry to hold Chemulpo and Zailoi. It is also said that the Nanyang mess has received orders to be ready to proceed to sea at a moment's notice, and that the military governor of Fengtien has also received telegraphic instructions to send a force of 5,000 cavalry.

A correspondent at Chemulpo writes as follows, under date of 15th ult: The revolt in Chullado is by no means quelled, although a few days ago a message was sent to the United States admiral on the Baltimore to the effect that General Hong had defeated the rebels killing the leader and taking Zenshu. It is reported that Hong does not want or intend to act against the rebels, and that orders have been sent to have him arrested.

A messenger who was sent by the rebels, offering not to punish the officials who had oppressed the people if they would lay down their arms, was killed by the rebels just at present matters are at standstill.

A terrible fire broke out Sunday, June 17, in the Japanese town on the bluff side of the creek in Yokohama. The fire originated in a laundry, but being in Gochon Motomachi through the carelessness of a maid servant. It broke out at 2 o'clock and was not completely extinguished till 10 o'clock. A number of houses were destroyed in 1894, and some fifty more were damaged by fire and water.

A telegram from Kumamoto, dated June 14, says that the Japanese prefecture, has been attacked by a disease which is believed to be the true plague. A severe cholera shock was experienced in Yokohama and the country for many miles around on Tuesday afternoon, June 18. Numerous buildings suffered and twenty lives were lost and many injured. The waterworks seemed to have suffered much and the water supply, which had already become much diminished, is now impure.

On the 11th two female missionaries belonging to the American Presbyterian mission were brutally attacked in the streets of a city on the opposite side of the river from Canton. One of them, a duly qualified medical practitioner, stopped to give assistance to a Chinaman, who had dropped down with the plague. She was immediately, and the terror-stricken Chinese accused her of causing his death. The women were stoned, one being killed. The other was rescued by the customs officials after a hard struggle.

H. M. S. Baitler, now at Canton, has been ordered to interfere if any more ill-feelings towards foreigners is shown.

MURDERED BY CHINESE. Victoria, B. C., July 5.—A passenger by the Empress of China states that just before the ship left Yokohama, it was reported that Commander Nihno, a Japanese naval officer, had been murdered by a Chinese newspaper correspondent, who accompanied him on the trip had been murdered by Chinese soldiers. The news created great excitement in Yokohama.

In the attack and capture of Zenshu, 200 insurgents were killed and seventy captured. The latter were put to death in the flight of the rebels. The ward Kintail, 560 were killed. The ex-governor of Zenshu has been exiled by the Korean government.

MURDERED HIS WIFE. Fourth of July Tragedy in Hoboken, N. J.

Hoboken, N. J., July 5.—Thomas McLaren, a brakeman on the Delaware and Hudson, was called to his home last night shot and killed Jennie Knottle, a woman who claimed to be his wife. The shooting occurred at the residence of Mrs. M. Knottle, 23rd street, where the woman had been staying for some time past. McLaren fired four shots, all of which took effect. Last May the woman had been arrested charged with bigamy. She had learned that he had recently married and at the same time claiming that he had married her in 1893. She failed to admit her marriage and her case was dropped. Then she refused to have anything more to do with McLaren, taking up her residence in the house on 23rd street. McLaren called there last night and because he did not return to her, and failing to influence her drew a revolver and shot her. Two of the bullets lodged in her left breast and she died a half hour later. The murderer escaped.
