



Upwards of Fifteen Thousand People Visited the Great Exposition Yesterday.

COMMISSIONER LEWIS TALKS

AN INTERESTING PROGRAMME CARRIED OUT IN THE EXPOSITION.

Description of the Educational Exhibit—Football Game and Balloon Ascension in the Afternoon—A Long List of Awards Made by the Judges Last Evening—The Manufacturers' Department—The Programme Arranged for Today—Fair Notes.

TAH'S great exhibition was viewed by thousands of school children yesterday.

They held undisputed sway in the building and grounds and studied the lesson spread out before them as assiduously as any presented to them in the schoolroom.

GATHERING OF THE YOUNGSTERS

It was a red-letter day for that contingent of Young America, and it was a large one, that visited the fair. The pupils of the outside public schools went to the exposition building under the escort of their teachers, marching to the scene of wonder and delight in military order.

Brigham Young Academy has a large and varied exhibit, the nature of which is indicated by the outlines of the courses of study, which were shown in large lettering on banners.

AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE

The Agricultural College exhibit is in an east room on the upper floor and contains collections of dried grains on the stalk, grasses, grains in sample, also sections of the internal organs, were shown by the students of physiology.

KING OF THE DURHAMS.

UNIVERSITY OF UTAH

"Quality, not quantity," is evidently

the motto of the university faculty, although limited space may have decided the extent of the exhibit. It was in compact form, but well arranged, and the showing by each of the three departments being an honor to the accredited board of the educational system of the territory—the University of Utah. In the collegiate department was the apparatus used in physical science, a creditable exhibit. There was also an Anzon manikin and a skeleton. The photographs of the university building and the class rooms, library and art room, were evidences of the excellent facilities offered by the institution. The normal department exhibited charts

for teaching color, and drawings illustrating science. The school for the deaf made a display that surprised every visitor. There was a good showing of needlework, although this was perhaps the least surprising of the work shown. There was a model of an engine, the handwork of Hartner Haddock of Riverdale. A sideboard of solid oak, a handsome piece of furniture, was the work of Nephi Larson, Andrew Madison, Earl Moore and Leo Hawkins, members of the class of carpentering.

LATTER-DAY SAINTS' COLLEGE

The Latter-day Saints' college exhibit occupied the next space on the left. There was a good showing of philosophical and chemical apparatus and a cabinet of natural history specimens, beside curious relics of travel.

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Ref and product maps were those of Europe ad Utah, which the vegetable and mineral products of every section were indicated by specimens of such products attached to the proper section of the map.

Salt Lake county makes a fine showing in similar lines, the drawings from objects being especially good.

KINDERGARTEN WORK

The Salt Lake Kindergarten has a tasteful and attractive booth in which there is some work by the pupils, but more by the teachers. As those ladies wished to show the continuity of thought that is the characteristic of the well conducted kindergarten, they exhibited works showing how it can be preserved. All the legends that deal with the story of Easter, and the more modern stories and customs relating to Thanksgiving day, are shown by the pretty symbols used by the kindergarten.
