

THE JURY IMPANELED.

The Hearing of the Thiede Case Begins Today.

SICHER'S TRIAL ON OCT. 22.

THE ALLEGED SLAYER OF MURANO PLEADS NOT GUILTY.

Gilbert D. Amos Granted a Divorce and Mrs. Amos Gets the Homestead and Alimony—Law and Motion Cases Before Judge Merritt—Mrs. Alban Sues For a Divorce—Attachment Suits Against the Walker House Proprietors—Supplement to the Law and Motion Calendar.

The work of impaneling a jury in the case of Charles Thiede, on trial for the wilful murder of his wife Mary, was resumed yesterday morning before Judge Baruch. Judge Howat appeared to prosecute and Cherry & Cherry for the defense. The defendant occupied a seat between his counsel and his fair-haired 13-year-old little girl sat on his right. There was a large attendance of the general public, but as the proceedings during the entire day consisted solely of examining jurors as to their qualifications to try the case, nothing of interest developed. By 4:30 o'clock the prosecution and defense had exhausted their peremptory challenges and no more challenges for cause being made, the panel was declared complete with the following twelve men in the box, in whose hands rests the fate of Charles Thiede:

A. R. Carter, miner; William J. Kinney, grocer; W. A. Sherman, architect; W. H. Evans, miner; E. P. Thornbury, real estate dealer; Lewis Grinolski, merchant; W. J. Parkin, farmer and market gardener; C. S. Favozar, solicitor; S. D. Colthron, insurance broker; C. H. Rampton, merchant; E. W. Layton, engineer and machinist; James Day, market gardener.

After the usual oath was administered the jury retired in charge of two bailiffs, after his honor had instructed the bailiffs to eliminate from the newspapers which the jurors might be given to read all reference to the case in hand. The other jurors subpoenaed on the special venire were excused and court adjourned till 10 o'clock this morning, when the trial will commence.

SICHER PLEADS

Not Guilty and the Trial is Set For October 22.

Modesto Slicher, the alleged slayer of Giuseppe Murano, was brought into court to plead, and by his attorney, L. A. Taylor, entered a plea of not guilty. District Attorney Howat asked that the trial be set for Oct. 22. The defendant's counsel resisted the motion and stated that his client has a good defense, but, as it is absolutely impossible for him to be ready to go to trial by that date. The man was friendly and penitent and it required both time and money to properly set up his defense. Mr. Taylor made a strong plea that the case go over for the term.

Judge Howat could see no reason for delay, and thought eleven days was ample time for the judgment. Judge Baruch sustained the same. The ground upon which the motion was based was that the indictment was bad, inasmuch as the term "butcher shop" did not come within the meaning of the statute. The court, in sustaining Attorney Morse's objection, held that a butcher shop was not necessarily a "house," one of the places named in the statute. In all probability an amended indictment will be presented by the grand jury.

There is also an indictment for grand larceny still hanging over the defendant's head, and upon this charge he will be tried later.

Miscellaneous Matters.

The People vs. Fred C. Lynberg, found guilty of having speared fish in his possession; time of sentence postponed for one week.

THE AMOS DIVORCE.

The Decree Granted and Mrs. Amos Awarded the Homestead.

Chief Justice Merritt yesterday handed down his decision in the divorce suit of Gilbert D. Amos vs. Martha E. Amos, heard the previous day. His honor granted the decree as prayed for by the husband, awarding the custody of the elder boy to the latter and the younger to Mrs. Amos. To Mrs. Amos was awarded the residence on Vine street, valued at \$2,500, and \$5 a week for the support of the child she takes.

He Was Crim and Inhuman.

Jane Alban is suing for a divorce from George Alban. The parties in-

termarried at Swansea, Wales, October 15, 1882. It is alleged that since the marriage defendant has treated plaintiff in a most cruel and inhuman manner, particularly on January 20, 1882, at Durango, Colo., he struck her and used vile and profane language to her and falsely accused her of infidelity, and on September 21 last, at Salt Lake city, also abused her and falsely accused her of infidelity. Wherefore plaintiff prays for a decree of divorce, and for temporary and permanent alimony.

MISSED A GOLDEN CHANCE.

Chairman Doremus' Exciting Experience with a Housebreaker.

THE FELLOW ESCAPED.

BANK TELLER TYRE IS STILL IN CUSTODY.

Charges Will Be Filed Against Him Today—Sever Foreman James Discharged—Minor Cases Disposed of by Justice Smith—Arrested For Keeping Swine in Violation of the Ordinance.

Chairman Doremus, of the board of public works, had an exciting experience with housebreakers yesterday afternoon. The gentleman was dressing for dinner and through the window of his bedroom saw a suspicious-looking fellow walk up to the side door and knock. Receiving no answer, the man endeavored to open the door, but failed. He then made signs to a pal, who was in waiting, and the second fellow put in an appearance. While one of the men stood on guard, the other went through a side window and found his way into the hall. Mr. Doremus had not been idle, and as the housebreaker stepped into the hall he opened another door and made for the fellow. Finding his bold play a worthless display of daring, the latter dashed back on his trail and went out at the window, closely followed by Mr. Doremus, who caught the man just as he cleared the window. His hold was not secure, however, and the would-be robber made his escape. As he fled from the premises, Mr. Doremus fired several shots at the fleeing felon, a revolver with which he was armed. The second man also made good his escape.

STILL IN CUSTODY.

Charges Against George C. Tyre to Be Filed Today.

George C. Tyre, the defaulting teller of the Walker Brothers Banking company, is still in the custody of the police at the city hall and today the formal charges will be preferred against him before Police Justice Smith.

In response to the appeal for assistance sent by Tyre to his relatives in Canada, a reply was yesterday received conveying the regrets of his family, but the statement that the members were unable to render the slightest financial aid. The Guarantee Company of North America will make the amount of the penitentiary bond for Tyre's personal bondsmen for the loss.

When questioned yesterday by representatives of the press, Tyre had no statement to make.

Before Judge Smith.

At the request of the prosecution, the charge of assault with a deadly weapon, standing against Samuel James, a sewer foreman, was dismissed and the defendant released from custody. Assistant County Attorney Eichnor, who appeared as prosecutor, stated that while it was true James had used his revolver in the argument, the complaining witness, August Peterson, had used undue force in his attempt to secure the chain, which he alleged had been stolen. While every man has the right to protect his own property, he could not take the law into his own hands, and the prosecution of James would hardly be the proper caper. Barlow Ferguson, the defendant's attorney was naturally of the same opinion and at their combined request, Justice Smith dismissed the case and ordered James' release. Five drunks were assessed the usual \$5.

Keeps Swine.

Mrs. Wilhelmina Franks yesterday filed a complaint against Mrs. David Heppson, residing at 8 and Third streets, charging her with keeping swine within the restricted district.

BROOK TROUT.

A Heavy Consignment of the Speckled Beauties For Utah. Utah is to receive a heavy consignment of brook trout from the National Fish commission and also another shipment of bass. Fish Commissioner Musser has received the following letters relative to these fish:

Washington, D. C., Sept. 22, 1894. A. Milton Musser, Esq., Salt Lake City, Utah: Dear Sir:—By the direction of the commissioner, 2,000 brook trout have been assigned to you, and they are being arranged to have them delivered at Salt Lake City by messenger or by one of the United States fish commission cars within sixty days. Please indicate by return mail your readiness to receive the consignment. Our agent will advise you in advance of the hour of his expected arrival, and arrangements should be effected by you with the telegraph operator for the prompt delivery of the message.

Vessels free from injurious matter, partly filled with pure fresh water and of a carrying capacity of 100 gallons, must be in readiness and conveniently placed for an immediate transfer of the fish the moment the train stops. The co-operation of the depot agent should be secured, that he may receive and care for the fish in your absence. The fish commission car will usually be found at rear end of train; the messenger in the regular baggage car.

FULLY EXONERATED.

THE CHARGE AGAINST PROFESSOR FRANK DRIGGS IS IGNORED.

Grand Jury Makes a Special Report on the Case—Yesterday's Proceedings in the First District Court.

Provo, Oct. 11.—The first case called today was The People vs. John Hill, charged with grand larceny. After the case had been called, it was learned that it had been tried two years ago and the man was sent to the penitentiary and had served his time. The prosecuting attorney scored the clerk for a little carelessness and the matter was dropped. The clerk under Judge Blackburn was at fault.

The grand jury reported having found indictments in five territorial and two United States cases and ignored one territorial and four United States cases, as follows: Sam Reid and Joseph Hill, robbery. J. G. Jorgensen, unlawful cohabitation. Frank Piastino, adultery. Jose Mari Bernard and Guadalupe Garcia, for selling liquor to Indians.

The grand jury also ignored the charge against Frank Driggs and reported on it as follows: In view of the position of Mr. Driggs as a teacher in the university, the grand jury feel it their duty to say that in this case there seems to have been no foundation whatever for the charge against him.

Central Building company vs. A. O. Smoot; set for November 17. John Knighthorn vs. John Rockhill et al.; set for October 27. George Hughes, charged with robbery, was arraigned and took till tomorrow at 2 p. m. to plead.

David Bigelow pleaded not guilty to an indictment against him for unlawful cohabitation. Time for trial was not fixed. The People vs. Underwood; dismissed. Chris Rasmussen vs. Gary S. Gates; dismissed at plaintiff's cost.
