Output of the Florence Fields Secured by the Trust.

END OF THREE YEARS' WAR

COLORADO COMPANIES WILL UNDOUBTEDLY BE ABSORBED.

Oil Has Been Lower in Salt Lake Than in the City of New York.

Citizens' Electric Light Company Coming to the Front Again—Capt. A. Middlemiss is Reported.

Have Organized a New Graphite Stone Company in Chicago—Class by Loss Being Readjusted.

Those who go to the grocery stores this morning to buy coal-oil will be met with the surprising and disturbing information that the fluid which is so necessary to the proper lighting of the minds of the people has jumped to almost double its present price.

Yesterday afternoon the wagons connected with the agency here of the Standard Oil company were sent out with orders to sell wholesale at 15 cents per gallon, and a few hours later they were recalled and given orders to put the price up to 18 cents.

It is possible that even this price will be raised within the next day or so, though those on the inside in the oil business believe that the price has now touched high-water mark and will remain at that figure for some time to come.

All during the winter the wholesale price of coal-oil has been in the neighborhood of 10 cents, and the dealers have been selling it at 15 cents per gallon.

The reason for the low rate has been found in the competition between the great Standard Oil trust and the Florence and other wells in Colorado.

The trust, for years, has been trying to starve the Colorado wells, and in order to do this it has been fighting the smaller companies with a view to exterminating them.

Its virulence during the last year in particular was of a nature to cause it to be said that during its continuance Utah and Colorado have been given lower rates, according to conditions, than any other section of the country.

For some weeks last winter the price of coal-oil in this region was down lower than it was even in New York city, while the difference was much more marked as regards other particular localities.

The fight grew so hot in Colorado and Utah during the period that it was being waged that the price of oil was simply a question of endurance.

While no very definite information has been received here as to the cause of the sudden jump, it is believed that the Colorado wells have at last proved the victor in the fight, and the smaller Colorado companies have been gobbled up.
