AGAINST THE AJAX CO.

R. G. Wilson Sues That Flining Company For \$45,000.

VERY COMPLICATED SUIT, ON SATURDAY THEY ARE TO EXPLAIN TO THE COURT.

Brown-Chemical Electrical Metal Saving Process is Attracting a Great Deal of Attention Among Mining Men—Some Recent Tests Have Given Very Good Results—Golden Gate Orders Are Now Undergoing Treatment—Hon. Robert C. Lund Tells of the Placers on the Lower Colorado—Good Results Being Obtained With the Dry Washers—General Mining News.

A mining suit has been commenced by R. G. Wilson of Baroka, against W. L. Snyder, Henry Shields, H. M. Ryan, the Ajax Mining company, and others, in which some \$45,000 are involved, and which appears to be of a very complicated nature, growing out of the old litigation between the Coppermopolis and Champlain companies.

The litigation between these two companies was terminated by a merging of all the varied interests of both and the incorporation of the two mines under the name of the Ajax Mining company, in which the individual defendants in the present suit were officers and directors. The plaintiff alleges that at the time of the consolidation he had an interest in the Champlain company, and that when the consolidation was effected, it was agreed that the shares of the Champlain stockholders in the Ajax, that they, as officers and directors of the company, had settled all their claims, but Mr. Wilson now comes forward and alleges that he never received anything for his shares, and that the whole of the Champlain property was conveyed to the Ajax, he claims that it is subject to the amount of his interest in the Champlain, of which he prays judgment.

Henry M. Ryan, who is made a co-defendant in the suit, says he sold his stock in the Ajax to Edward McIntyre and Frank Knox, and that he was under the impression that McIntyre and Knox had sold their shares to the Coppermopolis and Champlain had been settled, and that all their claims against the Coppermopolis and Champlain had been settled, and that the amount of his interest in the Ajax, he claims that it is subject to the amount of his interest in the Champlain, of which he prays judgment.

DeWey & Street are the attorneys for Mr. Wilson in the present suit.

THE NEW HIGH SCHOOL.

MATTER DISCUSSED BY THE COMMITTEE LAST NIGHT. A Variety of Opinions Expressed—Ideas as to the Cost of the Structure—No Decision Arrived At.

The buildings and grounds committee of the school board met last night to informally discuss the much mooted question of the projected high school for Salt Lake City.

One member said that the people in his precinct wanted no new high school, but that they would oppose by every means to that end; that they demanded that the school board should submit the proposition of a new high school to the people to vote upon the question, and that then they would know the scheme better than the school board.

Another member favored a report to the board to the effect that the question of a new high school be submitted to the people at the general election in November. This was debated by another member, who claimed that it would not be fair to submit so important a question on a ticket already surcharged with burning questions of the board; that if submitted to the people at all, which he doubted the advisability, it should go before them at the regular election in December. BEISS AGAINST WOODMAN.

SUIT FOR AN ACCOUNTING AND \$25,000 TRUST MONEY.

Hearing Before P. L. Williams as Referee—A. E. Cahoon Gives Bonds—District Court Orders, Suits Filed and Judgments Entered.

The hearing of the suit brought by Jacob A. Heiss against James F. Woodman was begun yesterday morning in the Third district court room before Hon. P. L. Williams as referee. Messrs. Lounsbury & Kahn are the attorneys for the plaintiff, and Messrs. W. C. Hall and Marshall & Royle for the defendant.

The suit was brought to have a decree of the court requiring the defendant to make a full accounting of a \$10,000 trust fund and its increase since 1872, now amounting to over \$25,000. The original sum, \$10,000, was bequeathed to his adopted daughter, Maria Jane Tuckfield, then a minor, by James Smith, and by the terms of the will the defendant and James M. Carter were appointed trustees and entered upon the duties thereof on July 1872. On May 10, 1878, Maria Jane Tuckfield and this plaintiff were married and on November 12 of the same year the lady died testate, leaving the amount of the said trust fund to her husband, J. A. Heiss, this plaintiff.

James M. Carter died in 1873, which was the defendant, Woodman. It is alleged, acted as sole trustee and has never paid over any of the trust fund or the increase thereof, for which sum, about \$25,000, plaintiff demands judgment.

The defendant denied that he received the \$10,000 from the executors of James Smith and alleged that on July 1872 he signed the receipt for the same with Carter, the co-trustee, but that Carter received the money and managed the fund; that the defendant never managed the fund even after the death of Carter, and that the sum of \$10,000 was fully paid, settled and satisfied to the said Maria Jane Tuckfield in her lifetime.

The case will take several days to hear.

Cahoon Gives Bonds.

A. E. Cahoon yesterday filed bonds before United States Commissioner Greenman in the sum of \$1,000 for his appearance to answer to two of the indictments found against him by the grand jury. His sureties were John Gordon, A. A. Cahoon and Peter Johnson.

Failed to Make a Case.

R. J. Bailey had a hearing yesterday before United States Commissioner Greenman on a charge of befouling the waters of Parley's creek by keeping a herd of sheep in close proximity thereto. The complaining witness was J. L. McMurray, and after a protracted hearing the case was dismissed for the reason that the prosecution failed to make a case.
