Important Move of the Rio Grande Western.

TO CONSOLIDATE OFFICES.

THEY WILL BE LOCATED IN THE DOOLY BLOCK.

Traffic Manager, Passenger Agent, Superintendent, Treasurer and Auditor to Go There in May—Western Passenger Association—The Funding Bill—Latest by Wire—Local Notes.

The Rio Grande Western has decided to consolidate its local offices, and on about May 1 they will all, with the exception of the ticket office, be located in the Dooly block.

This will bring the offices of the traffic manager, passenger department, general superintendent, treasurer and auditor close together, and will be a convenience all around.
