

INSURGENTS ARE AT WORK

A Plot to Blow Up the Havana Waterworks.

MUCH DAMAGE WAS DONE ATTEMPT TO SHUT OFF THE WATER SUPPLY.

Greatest Apprehension is Felt on Account of the Secrecy and Effectiveness With Which the Insurgents Carried Out Their Scheme—Smallpox Breaks Out at Havana—Other Cuban Chatter.

HAVANA, June 14.—This city was startled and alarmed last night at 9 o'clock by the noise of two successive explosions, which shook the ground for a long distance and were heard for several miles.

HOW EXTENSIVE IS THE DAMAGE done, or how long it will require to remedy it.

The windows in many houses in the city were shattered by the reverberation of the explosion and some market structures were badly damaged.

There is no doubt but that the dynamite which caused this wreck was placed by agents of the insurgents.

It is believed the insurgents are bent upon investing Havana by cutting off such as possible from the city.

SMALLPOX HAS BROKEN OUT here, and in the unwholesome state of affairs, threatens to become epidemic.

Many are suffering from measles and there is much intestinal trouble among the inhabitants of the city.

The failure of the water supply under these conditions is a dire calamity.

It is the announced intention of the authorities to continue the campaign against the insurgents, in spite of the unhealthy rainy season having set in.

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MUTUAL TAFFY.

Emperor William Grants Li Hung Chang an Audience.

BERLIN, June 14.—Emperor William granted an imposing audience today to Li Hung Chang in the knight's hall of the old castle.

Li Hung Chang in the royal carriage, escorted by Uhlans, Emperor William and Empress Augusta were seated upon their thrones, surrounded by royal princes.

Chancellor Von Hohenlohe and Freiherr Marschall Von Bismarck, the minister of foreign affairs were also present.

THE SECOND PLACE.

It is Believed Governor Bradley Would Accept It.

FRANKFORT, Ky., June 14.—Governor Bradley and party left last evening. The action of the governor in attending the convention is construed to mean that his name will go before the convention.

D. E. Hottel Kelly, who was secretary of the convention which instructed for Bradley for president and who accompanied Governor Bradley to St. Louis, said to an Associated Press representative:

Governor Bradley has assured me that he does not desire second place on the ticket. The greatest apprehension is felt on account of the secrecy and effectiveness with which the insurgents have been able to carry out the outrage.

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HOTEL AND CORRIDOR.

Manager S. Edkins, of the Consolidated Investment Company, of Johannesburg, South African Republic,

was seen at the Knutsford last evening in company with J. C. Phillips, of the same place.

Mr. Philip acted as American consul at Port Elizabeth twelve years ago and is a very important man in South Africa.

Mr. Edkins said "the output of gold from the Transvaal this coming year will far surpass the American."

Had it not been for the McArthur-Forrest cyanide process of dealing with ores the output would amount to little, but it has been the very salvation of the country.

The extraction cost is going down steadily and all expenses in the mines are being lessened every year.

As for the cost of ore treatment, it varies. At first the cost of transportation was enormous, but it has been so reduced that it seems impossible to further cheapen it.

The Rand is full of dykes and broken reefs, making the cost vary; but 20 shillings per ton will usually cover the cost of treatment, and from eight to ten pennyweights are usually obtained from a ton of ore.

The internal discussions wrought things up so last year that the output of the mines—rich as they are—could not be pushed ahead of America.

The richest mines run directly through Johannesburg, being situated on a reef forty miles in length.

There seems to be a never-ending supply of ore; it is just as good at the bottom as anywhere, and some of the shafts have been sunk to over a mile.

Sixty years from now, when other fields have almost been forgotten, these mines will still be booming, for the reefs run at an angle, the main reef being about twelve feet wide.

There are a large number of Cornishmen in the mines, and four companies employ 70,000 men, natives and white.

The companies are as follows: The Robinson, having an output of 15,000 ounces a month; the Primrose, Crown Reef and Langlaagte, each with an output of 10,000 a month each.

The property of these famous companies are all on the mother vein.
