

LUKE FOUND GUILTY

After Six Hours' Deliberation the Jury Returns a Verdict.

TWENTY DAYS' STAY

TO PREPARE STATEMENT OF MOTION FOR NEW TRIAL.

Ellen Higham Granted a Decree of Divorce—List of Cases on the Law and Motion Calendar Coming Up on Peremptory Call Before Judge Street This Morning—Court Notes.

Judge Hiles delivered his charge to the jury yesterday morning in the case of the state against James A. Luke, charged with perjury, and a few minutes after 10 o'clock the jury retired to consider the case and withdrew with it until 4 o'clock in the afternoon, when Bailiff Cook announced they had reached a verdict. Judge Hiles was obliged to leave for Covalville, but Judge Hines was in attendance to receive it.

The verdict was guilty and the defendant was granted twenty days' stay of judgment in which to prepare and serve statement on motion for a new trial.

Divorce Granted. Ellen Higham was granted a decree of divorce by Judge Ritchie from Amrose S. Higham on the grounds of cruelty, failure to support and desertion.

The parties were married on November 29, 1894, and only lived together two months. The plaintiff was allowed to resume her maiden name of Ellen Ostlund.

AN IMPORTANT MOVE

Topographical Reconnaissance by the Fort Douglas Garrison.

THE PLAN GIVEN IN DETAIL

OFFICERS WHO WILL HAVE CHARGE OF THE WORK.

Second Lieutenant Castle is the Engineer Officer—Surgeon-Major Girard—The New Water Gauge—The Post School.

The plan for a topographical reconnaissance of the roads south of the post for a distance of two miles and tributary to Emigration canyon was yesterday handed to the officers designated by the commandant to take part in the exercises today, by Second Lieutenant Charles W. Castle, engineer officer.

Each detail, comprising one officer and two non-commissioned officers, will leave the post today at 7:30, carrying light field equipment and lunch. Following is the plan:

Instructions for reconnaissance practice, Sept. 3, 1896:

Assume that an army advancing westward on a single line of operations has passed down Emigration canyon and across the valley by the Garfield Road. Each road has been left in camp upon a defensive position at the mouth of Red Butte canyon to protect a supply depot and to hold this point on the line of communication there is immediate danger of a cavalry raid being directed against the depot from a direction unknown. The commanding officer orders that parties be sent out to make a rapid topographical reconnaissance of the roads in the vicinity with a view to arranging a system of patrol and outposts.

Each party will advance at least ten miles in the road assigned to it, starting from the flagstaff as an initial point. Each detail will be directed in conventional colors upon a single piece of paper and submitted to the engineer officer for compilation as soon as possible after the return. Scale two inches to one mile. Practical information will be noticed completely as practicable under all the heads prescribed in the road reconnaissance blank except those relating to positions or camping grounds. Officers are assigned as follows:

Lieutenant Sorley, by bicycle, Eleventh East and Twelfth South streets. Lieutenant Woodward, by escort wagon, Third street and City Creek canyon.

Lieutenant Erwin, by bicycle, South Temple street and Hot Springs road. Lieutenant Palmer, by horse, upper canyon. Lieutenant Palmer, by horse, upper canyon road through Holiday.

Lieutenant Spence, by horse, through city and across the Jordan via Third street. Lieutenant Carey, by bicycle, road to Dr. Miller, via Sugar House road.

Lieutenant Palmer, by escort wagon, Emigration canyon, returning by Mountain Dell basin and Parley's canyon. Lieutenant Simmons, by escort wagon, Parley's canyon, meeting Lieutenant Preston at Parley's.

CHARLES W. CASTLE, Second Lieutenant Sixteenth infantry, Engineer's office.
