Some idea of the proportions to which the promoters of Line City, in the new gold district known as the State Line mining district, expected the camp to attain may be gleaned from the fact that at the mouth of the two canyons which cut the district about two miles east and west and half a mile north and south. Line City is located some sixteen miles west of Deer Springs at the foot of the pass across the stages back and forth from Prochee formerly passed. At present it consists of twenty-two houses, log and frame, two of which are stores, one a shoe shop, one a hotel, another a boarding house, one a barber shop and the remainder private structures. Several additional buildings are in course of construction or contemplated and the indications are that before the close of the present year the camp will have assumed rather extensive proportions; and it will, without question, should any of the mine owners commencing outside construction of a mill or shafting outside capital decide to take the initial step toward

As before stated, the general strike of the district is north and south, with the silver-gold vein cutting the gold zone from the northwest to the southeast. The country rock is a combination porphyry, granite and quartz, the latter being quartz, orthopyroxene and granite. The silver quartz is nearly blue, native metal showing frequently, while the gold quartz tends toward the red.

The Creole, located just west of the town of Line, is owned by McBurney, Millet and McDonald. It has made several shipments to the valley smelter, and the shipments demonstrated that the ore should be milled at the property, where it would give handsome returns. The last shipment is reported to have given in the neighborhood of three ounces in gold and a small amount of silver, while the general average of the four-foot vein opened up in several places on the property is between \$18 and \$25 in gold.

On the Creole there is a very rich streak from a feather edge to eight inches in width. The Creole is developed with a 40-foot tunnel, a shaft 100 feet in depth and a number of light tunnels and open cuts. It is the intention of the owners to sink the shaft to a depth of 200 feet, from which point a crosscut to the vein will be driven.

of the machine, left last night for the scene of operations. The Crisis tilling pit, according to a conservative estimate, contains 50,000 tons of tailings which carry values of six ounces in silver to the ton, and the tailings can be treated by the Mitchell amalgamator at a cost less than a dollar.

At the Leeds pits there are about 40,000 tons of tailings, the estimated value of which is \$150,000. It is expected that with one machine the five tons of tailings which are treated daily, and if the anticipated success is met with it is the intention to put in a plant with a daily capacity of 200 tons.

There are a great many old dumps at Silver Reef that will carry average values of from eight to twelve ounces in silver, and if the Mitchell amalgamator, with a concentrator attachment, is a success in saving the values, it will pay to pulverize every dump in the district and run the pulp through these machines.

There is a large amount of ore in the mines of Silver Reef above water level, which will pay to work with this cheap process; and as the process proves its efficiency, there is every reason to believe that the camp will resume its wonted activity and popularity. The metal is found in sandstone and exists in the shape of free silver in a native state, black sulphides, horn and ruby silver.

THE SOUTH SWANSEA

A Silver City Mine With a Most Excellent Showing.

The management of the South Swansea mine is making arrangements to send in a hundred-ton shipment of good ore by the end of the week. Five carloads are now ready and the sixth will be loaded today, so that within two or three days the lot will find its way to the valley smelting works.

The ore above mentioned has been taken out in doing development work only and in cleaning up about the mine, and now, with everything all clear and the ore bins empty, sinking will be pushed as rapidly as possible; and the sale of the lot of ore will replenish the treasury of the company to an extent that will admit of a large amount of development work without the necessity of the shipment of another pound of ore for a long time to come.

It is conceded by all who are familiar with the South Swansea, that there is every reason to believe that it will develop into a great, or even greater mine than the Swansea, and the development of the latter mine is in fact showing up in a very satisfactory manner the value of the former.

On the 450-foot level of the Swansea a drift has been run on mineral sand at the point the face of the drift discloses fourteen feet of good ore, and the vein continues on into the South Swansea ground. At the face of the drift at the South Swansea end line, the South Swansea is one of the few excellent work in the development of the South Swansea mine.

As the South Swansea continues to sink in depth, it can easily, at any time, make connections with the drifts in the Swansea, and at the same time take out high grade ore and improve the ventilation of the two properties.

The Swansea, under the superintendence of Will H. Hildner, is developing into a magnificent producer. All of the workings of the mine are in ore, and as depth is attained the ore bodies increase in size and value.

The property, however, was not for sale, as the stockholders, who are Salt Lake people, believe they have a good thing themselves, and will work it—Inter-Mountain, Butte, Mont.

The three Margretts brothers and Mr. Fugley have a promising claim on Esden Peak from which they have obtained good gold values. The claim has been developed by a twelve-foot incline shaft, in the bottom of which samples of ore have been taken that gave assays of \$1.80 to \$2.00 to the ton in the yellow metal. The boys will resume work on the property this fall and believe that they have the making of a mine.

The Butte Inter-Mountain says: A contract was awarded this week by the Anaconda company for the erection of a silver mill at Anaconda. The mill will be erected in front of the old refinery between the upper and lower main shafts, and will be used to treat the silver slimes which come from the mill. The building will be 146 feet long, 75 feet wide and 25 feet high and will have a capacity of 500,000 ounces monthly. There will be four furnaces and two dry pans each containing ten tanks. The old mill will be torn down.

Dan Call, Tracy Fairchild and T. C. Bunkley, Jr., of Tascorosa, Nev., are in the city on their way home from Kansas City, where they have been with a shipment of live stock. Mr. Call, who presides over the leading hotel of Tascorosa, and who is one of the veteran miners of the camp, informs The Herald that the Dexter mine at that place, which is owned by a Salt Lake company, is the best and most promising silver property ever opened in that locality; and he further says that the action of the Salt Lake miners in opening this property in a thorough manner and the putting in of reduction works at that place by the company, is infusing new life into the camp, and that now several other properties there are being actively developed.

CROWDED HIGH SCHOOL

Need of a Suitable Building Again Emphasized.

THE FACILITIES ARE POOR

FIVE HUNDRED PUPILS HAVE ALREADY BEEN ENROLLED.

They Are the Flower of the Lower School Graduates—Superintendent Millsap and the Trustees Have Made the Best Arrangement Possible, Under Unfavorable Circumstances—The State University.

Now that the public schools have opened for the year, the old question of whether Salt Lake will support a high school is again being agitated. This question has been discussed more or less for the past four years and has ended where it began, in talk.

The high school on South Temple street opened its doors Monday morning and already has enrolled 500 pupils, and this number will grow. There would undoubtedly have been more already if it were not for the imperfect accommodations. There were 280 pupils who finished at the public schools last year, and out of that number there were only 125 who reported at the opening of the high school. This is caused largely, no doubt, by the fact that people who have had the privilege of studying in our public school buildings, which are equipped with every convenience and are unsurpassed by any public schools in the country, refuse to enter the high school, with all its disadvantages.

The high school building was formerly a furniture store, which has been remodeled and made as attractive as possible. There are also a row of stone class rooms, but they are all unsatisfactory for this particular purpose. The ventilation is poor, as are also the light and the heating facilities. Despite all reports to the contrary, though, the pupils who have entered are being well taken care of and more can be accommodated if necessary. Everything is being done by the teachers to make the pupils comfortable, and in the majority of cases the pupils also are accommodating themselves to the circumstances. But that this state of things cannot go on indefinitely is admitted by all. The public school building, which cost \$150,000, this sum, when looked at in the aggregate, sounds large, especially so during these hard times, but it is believed if more could be put in figures showing how little each citizen would have to pay if a slight additional tax was levied, instead of how much, the proposition would meet with favor. There is a rental of \$1,000 being paid yearly for the use of the high school building. This rent will have to be paid right along, with a prospect of paying more.

The pupils are received on their diplomas at several leading colleges, and if this work is to be continued the citizens will have to see to it that a building so necessary and in which such good work could be accomplished should be provided.

The practice of marching large classes from the South Temple street building down to the recreation rooms and back, through all kinds of weather, is a serious matter in itself. One suggestion that has been made is that, until a suitable building, with accommodations for all is secured, one of the classes, perhaps the senior, might be housed in another locality, which would relieve the pressure to a large extent.
