

ARE ON A STILL HUNT

The County Republican Committee Suddenly Shuts Shop.

"ME AND GUS" OUT TALKING

PLAN TO ORGANIZE A REGISTRARS PROTECTIVE ASSOCIATION.

It Failed to Take Definite Form—Arthur Brown Making Copies of His Silver Speech—Political News of the City and County.

At Republican county headquarters matters are becoming very quiet as concerns plans for the campaign.

Th colonel was in an affable mood yesterday, and vouchsafed the intelligence that the meeting at Hill's park, which was to be held in the afternoon, had been postponed until Tuesday evening next, on account of the opening of the Crescent bridge.

But on Tuesday they expect to have a great time. All the candidates will be there, including the candidate for sheriff, who is going to attempt to enlarge his acquaintance.

Whether or not Conde sings or makes a speech depends, not upon his voice, but whether he has a song written for himself or not. One of the many poets laureates which the party contains is said to be engaged on a new song for the candidate who is entitled "In a White, and on My Muscle; I Can Lift 900 Pounds."

McKale will recite his famous "Cutting the Pensions Down," with some new variations which he has composed. Besides these melodious and elocutionary features, there will be a lot of fiddling by a well known fiddler, some music on a guitar by a well known guitarist, several readings of well known speeches, and a lot of dancing by well known dancers.

Sandwiches will be sold at the usual rates, the same warranted to contain real ham, which will be served with ginger ale and buttermilk, and other drinkables galore. Everybody is invited to come and get a feed of provender and intellectual pabulum.

The opening of the Crescent bridge is going to be a non-partisan affair, and will be attended by such non-partisans as Geddes, Christopherson, Reese, Conde, Parsons, Fisher and many of the people who are running on the non-partisan ticket.

Reports received by the campaign managers of the Republican party are to the effect that the Democrats are far and away in the lead in the registration, and they are greatly concerned thereat. Usually the voters do not all go to the polls, and the difference in the rolls this year, as concerns those who are not registered, has been made as many in number as the Republicans expected to lose.

In order to get the workers up to a pitch of enthusiasm, letters were yesterday sent out to a great many in the city. The bundle of mail was so large that Joe Cottle had to be summoned to lick postage stamps.

Chairman Holmes is being pursued by a colored man, who wants an interview. This colored man does not belong to the "push," but he tells candidates and others that he can save the party, and that he wants to do it.

There will be a meeting of the committee of the 37th, 38th, 39th, 40th, 41st, 42nd and 43rd precincts, comprised in the Fourth municipal ward, at Tompkins hall this evening at 7 o'clock, and every member of the campaign committee as well as of the ward committee is expected to be present.

A non-partisan German-American mass meeting will be held at the Germania club, 61 East Second South street, at 8 o'clock which will be addressed by Hon. H. B. Easton, Hon. Fisher S. Harris, on the issues of the day. Judge Morris Sommers, Hon. William Kahn and M. Kopp will also be present. Everyone is invited to attend.

The Republican meeting that was to be held at the Board of Labor hall on Tuesday evening, was postponed for various reasons. The important one was that only two of the speakers were present.

Reports from all over the state received by the chairman of the Democratic executive committee are to the effect that the party is gaining every day. From Cache the welcome news is received that the Citizens' Ticket, which was nominated up there is not meeting with approval, and that the Democrats are bound to win.

The Democrats of the Third municipal ward have made arrangements for a tonight at 8 o'clock, which will, if possible, eclipse the successful meeting held Tuesday evening. The speakers will be James H. Moyle, S. A. Kenner and Mrs. E. R. La Barthe and a glee club will contribute to the entertainment.

KESSLER FOUND GUILTY

The Jury Says It Was Voluntary Manslaughter.

BOB THOMPSON'S TRIAL

PROSECUTION REDUCES THE CHARGE TO MANSLAUGHTER.

De Witt C. Wolverton Sues the Union Pacific Railway Company for \$50,000 Damages for the Loss of a Foot—Supreme Court Opinion in Gillett vs. Taylor—Miscellaneous Court News.

The jury in the Kessler murder case which retired to consider their verdict at 2:30 o'clock on Tuesday afternoon, were out all that night and until 11 o'clock yesterday morning, when they came into court with a verdict of voluntary manslaughter.

The verdict would be voluntary manslaughter or murder in the second degree, and finally the lesser crime was agreed upon and returned. Kessler's first trial resulted in a verdict of murder in the second degree and he was sentenced to 14 years' imprisonment in the penitentiary. That verdict and the sentence were set aside when the new trial was granted.

The punishment for voluntary manslaughter is from one to ten years in the penitentiary.

BOB THOMPSON'S TRIAL

Prosecution Reduces the Charge from Murder to Manslaughter.

The case of Bob Thompson, charged with the murder of Tom Carter, was called in Judge Hill's division of the district court yesterday morning. Both Thompson and Carter were colored men and pupils and were engaged in a glove contest before the Salt Lake Athletic club one evening in June last.

In the course of the contest Thompson hit Carter a blow on the side of the face which caused Carter to fall backwards and his head to come in very violent contact with the floor, rendering him unconscious. He lingered in that condition all night and died the next day.

Thompson was charged with murder and held in the district court for trial, and yesterday County Attorney Whitmore and Assistant County Attorney Waite appeared to prosecute, and Attorneys Straup and McCallum represented Thompson.

At the outset the county attorney elected to reduce the charge to manslaughter, and it was so entered. The work of empanelling a jury commenced early in the afternoon, the jury in attendance were empaneled and only six men in the box. A venire for more jurors was issued and the court adjourned till 9:30 o'clock this morning.

HEAVY DAMAGE SUIT.

Mr. Wolverton Wants \$50,000 for the Loss of a Foot.

De Witt C. Wolverton has commenced suit in the Third district court against the receivers of the Union Pacific Railway company to recover \$50,000 damages alleged to have been sustained by personal injury.

It is alleged in the complaint that on October 24, 1892, the plaintiff was run into by an engine and train of cars belonging to the defendant company running on North Temple street and was so injured that his left foot had to be amputated and he has not been able to attend to any business since.

The accident, it is alleged, was caused by the negligence of the company in not keeping the engine and train under control, in not sounding a bell or whistle as a warning that the train was approaching and in running the train at a greater speed than eight miles an hour, the limit allowed within the city.

SUPREME COURT.

Opinion in the Case of Gillett vs. Taylor.

In the case of Granville Gillett vs. Thomas E. Taylor, appellant, the supreme court yesterday handed down an opinion written by Justice Barich and concurred in by Chief Justice Zane and Justice Kiser, which reverses the judgment of the lower court and remands the case with directions to grant a new trial.

The suit was brought on a promissory note for \$200, signed by John W. Taylor, and the appellant herein, the defendant set up an affirmative defense and offered to prove that although the appellant signed the note as principal, he was in fact only a surety and received no part of the money for which the note was given or any consideration at all.

Shortly after the maturity of the note the plaintiff, without the knowledge or consent of the appellant, extended the time of payment for a valuable consideration, and that the plaintiff at the time he accepted the note knew that this appellant was only a surety.

The offer to prove those things was rejected, and the proof of defendant limited to an express agreement between the payee and the makers that the payee had accepted Thomas E. Taylor as surety. The result was a judgment for the plaintiff against this appellant.

The opinion held that the exclusion of the evidence to prove the allegations named was erroneous and that the case was tried under a mistaken view of the law, hence the reversal.

Brook Damage Suit.

The suit of William Brook against the Rio Grande Western Railway company, in which the plaintiff seeks to recover \$15,000 damages for personal injuries, was resumed before Judge Street and a jury yesterday and was proceeding at the hour of adjournment.
