THREE SUSPECTS HELD ACCUSED OF THE MURDER OF FRED BEUTLER, THE OLD UMBRELLA MENDER.

The Dead Man's Wife and Rice Very Unwilling to Testify—Mitchell's Futile Attempt to Prove an Alibi—Verdict of the Coroner's Jury—The Police Are on the Lookout For Another Man Whom They Think is Implicated in the Crime.

Harriet Beutler, John Rice and Elvin Mitchell, implicated in the murder of Fred Beutler by a coroner's jury, now occupy separate cells in the county jail, and for a time the horror of the strangling nightmare will subside. The inquest into the garrotting of the umbrella mender was not without its tense incidents yesterday morning and afternoon. Four hours were given over to the examination of those whose testimony was expected to weave a web of circumstances about three interested parties, either of whom might be said to have been fashioned for murder.
