SHEEP MAN ARRESTED FOR BE-FOULING WATERS.

Funeral Services of Mrs. Tyler at Beaver-Park City Fire Department Elects Officers-Furnishing the A. O. U. W. Lodge Rooms-Rev. Illif in Heber-Evidence of Progress Along the Weber.

Provo, April 16.-Sheriff Storrs and Deputy Henry returned today from Highland, where they made a little round-up of lawbreakers. It seems that the Highland people were partying in some festivities in the way of a grand ball and kindred amusement, when by way of diversion two dogs were brought together for a friendly set-to. Otto Neilson and George Nelson drove up during the excitement, jumped out of their wagon and attempted to manage the affair. The result was a free-for-all fight took place, during which George Neilson whipped out a revolver and began to smash people over the head with it. The shooting ran high, but the revolver put a quietus on the riot and the reckless George imagined himself as great a hero as Don Quixote. But the Neilson boys were arrested by the sheriff and taken to jail. They will have their hearing before Justice Hunter of American Fork tomorrow.

A. N. Larsen of the same place was arrested for allowing his sheep to graze on the crests above American Fork, and will also be examined before Justice Hunter. County Attorney KING will go to look after the prosecution of the case.

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GRIFFIN DIVORCE SUIT

The Well Known Contractor Files His Complaint.

MAKES VERY SERIOUS ALLEGATIONS AGAINST HIS WIFE.

Says She is Addicted to Drink and Has the Morphine Habit-Mrs. Griffin Will Reply in Due Course and Her Intimate Friends Claim the Allegations are Unfounded.

Jacob H. Griffin, the well-known contractor, yesterday afternoon entered in the district court, suit for divorce from his wife, Annie P. Griffin. It is set up in the complaint that the marriage took place on July 4, 1883 at Louisville, Ky., and that for some years Mrs. Griffin has been an habitual drunkard and, using in immediate connection with her drinking, and other strong drinks, and in taking as much as half a pint of whisky at one draught and remaining drunk for a week at a time. Mr. Griffin also alleges that his wife is addicted to the habitual use of morphine, opium and other narcotics, including the smoking of cigarettes, to such an extent that she is unfit for any domestic or marital affection. It is also alleged that Mrs. Griffin is a strong masculine woman with an unenviable temper and frequently when in a fit of passion struck plaintiff in the face and abused him in public by calling him bad names. She, it is claimed, also interfered with his business, insisting that he was too stupid to manage it, and properly attempted to assume control of his business, which was at one time a success. Plaintiff alleges that owing to his wife's conduct he has been compelled to leave his home and live separately and apart from his wife; that he is afraid to live with her, dreading that she will poison him or the boy and in conclusion he prays for a decree of divorce, the custody of his child and that Mr. Griffin be restrained from interfering with him in the possession of the boy.

The parties have been far from harmonious in their married relations for a long time, and it appears that both had almost fully made up their minds that it was impossible for them to get along together and that a question of divorce, each being most anxious to have the custody of the child, to which they are greatly attached.

Mrs. Griffin says that it had been agreed between them that no steps should be taken until after the present time, or at least during the absence of her attorney, Judge Le Grand Young, and she was therefore surprised and grieved when the suit was filed yesterday.

She was not prepared to make any statement of her line of defense yet, but it is understood that the charges against her are untrue, and that she will be compelled and Mrs. Griffin's intimate friends say they can be completely refuted.
