The fifth and last shot was fired with the muzzle of the revolver pressed into the cloth firmly. This one made a very clean-cut hole about half an inch in diameter, with the edge of the cloth

turned to a crisp, and left no trace of powder-burn on the surface.
THE FIFTH SHOT.
Shot No. 5 corresponded exactly with the bullet hole in the roof worn by J. H. Hamilton on the night of his death and proves conclusively that the pistol with which the fatal shot was fired was pressed firmly against his body, which clearly establishes that either he held the pistol in his own hand or that the person who did hold it was in the yard with him at the time the shot was fired.

The suicide theory is disproved by the fact that Hamilton could not have held the pistol in his right hand and shot himself through the heart in the direction which the fatal shot was fired. That he held it in his left hand is unlikely, because he was right-handed; and, again, a man would scarcely fire six shots at his own body unless every shot was intended to kill. He could not have operated a pistol after receiving a bullet in the heart. If Hamilton did not kill himself, who did?

IMPLICATES PAVEY.
Confession of Mrs. Hamilton Found in the Dead Man's Pockets.
That Mrs. Hamilton was criminally intimate at divers times with Charles Pavey is manifested by her confession in a letter found in the pockets of the dead man among other papers, a copy of which is inserted herewith.
