THE DELEGATES ARRIVING

Trans-Mississippi Commercial Congress Convenes This Morning.

IN THE ASSEMBLY HALL

Hon. Henry R. Whitmore, of St. Louis, Will Preside.

Until Mr. Bryan Arrives Tomorrow—About Five Hundred Delegates, Many of Whom Are Accompanied by Their Wives, Are Expected to Be Present—Twenty-four States Represented—Programme For Today and Several Arrangements For the Congress.

The ninth annual session of the Trans-Mississippi Commercial Congress will open in the assembly hall in Temple square at 11 o'clock this morning, with probably between 400 and 500 delegates present.

Everything is in readiness for the meeting of the congress, which promises to be one of the most successful sessions ever held.

Arrivals Yesterday. A hundred or more delegates, many of them accompanied by their wives, arrived yesterday.
