Further Details of the Conflagration That Swept the Camp Sunday.

ACCURATE FIGURES AS TO LOSSES AND THE INSURANCE CARRIED

Herald's Original Estimate Very Near the Mark--Shelter and Food For All--No Public Aid Will Be Required.

Park City can scarcely be said to have had an awakening yesterday morning, for the previous night was one of nervous excitement to the inhabitants, many of whom watched over the smoldering ruins to prevent any further spread of the conflagration.

SHAFTER AT SANTIAGO

Officials Quite Certain the Army Has Arrived.

GUESS WORK AND THEORY

WILL TAKE SEVERAL DAYS TO LAND.

Sampson and Shafter Will Decide Upon the Landing Points, Which Will Be Cleared of the Enemy By Warships--Transports Sighted On Sunday In Windward Passage.

Washington, June 20--No doubt is entertained at either the war or navy department that General Shafter's expedition has arrived safely off Santiago by this time.

Meanwhile the fleet of transports would lie out at sea at least ten miles beyond the blockading squadron, in order to be entirely safe from attack by Spanish torpedo boats.

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FIVE THOUSAND PRISONERS HELD

Philippine Insurgents Winning Brilliant Victories.

FREEDOM OF ISLANDS

FORMALLY DECLARED

Aquinaldo Is President of the Republic.

Insurgents Desire to Become An American Colony, But Will Not Yield to Any Other Nation--American Troops Expected to Arrive Today--Spanish Captain General Retires to the Walled City--Wholesale Desertions.

Hongkong, June 20--The United States transport Zafiro, which has just arrived here and anchored in Chinese waters, brought news from Manila harbor under date of June 17, from which it appears that the insurgents now hold 4,000 Spaniards and 1,000 native prisoners, together with their arms.

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BRYAN GOES TO PORTO RICO.
