pellant, vs. Ledyard M. Bailey, administrator of the estate of James Borz, deceased, the supreme court yesterday handed down an opinion reversing the judgment of the district court and rendering the case with directions to grant a new trial, and, if desired, to allow the parties to amend their pleadings. The complaint was filed Oct. 21, 1937, asking that the plaintiff be subrogated to the rights of Ann North Leaker, under a mortgage for \$4,265.42, which appellant paid to her in order to prevent a foreclosure thereof. The mortgage, at the time of the payment, was a proper claim upon the land as against the estate of the deceased. The land covered by the mortgage had, previous to the settlement of the estate, been conveyed to the appellant by the sole legatee under the will, under the provisions of which there were no debts except the mortgage in question, and that the estate was solvent. After appellant had paid the mortgage a claim was allowed in favor of the brother of the deceased, which absorbed the entire estate, and left the appellant without anything to reimburse him for money paid to prevent a foreclosure.

The lower court sustained a demurrer to the complaint, and the plaintiff refusing to amend, the case was dismissed, from which ruling the appeal was taken.

The opinion was written by Justice Miner, and concurred in as to the result by Chief Justice Zane and Justice Bartsch.

THE MAYOR'S APPEAL. I deem it my duty to call your attention to the terrible conflagration which occurred at Park City on the 19th inst., and to the fact that it has contributed so much to our prosperity and wealth, is now a scene of desolation and destruction. Her inhabitants are homeless, and many of them in a condition of destitution and want. The dictates of humanity demand that we, who are so highly favored by the enjoyment of the same, should lend a helping hand to our unfortunate neighbors, who in such dire distress, I therefore, recommend that a suitable appropriation be made by your honorable body for the relief of the inhabitants of Park City.

THE SUM SWELLED TO \$2,500. On request of President Robertson, action on the report was deferred for one week.

The mayor submitted the appointment of Nightwatchman Brigham Mikesell as a special policeman, without compensation from the city. Under suspension of the rules for the sprinkling of South Temple street from Third to Fourth West streets, was given the same reference.

G. G. Ferry requested employment to do the work of the finance committee.

Building Inspector Folsom directed attention to the urgent need of having numerous repairs and improvements made to the police station building, especially to the balcony, cornice, roof and tower, referred to the committee on fire and police.

Supervisor Sedon informed the council that he had referred a list of all the unassessed real estate in the city, and that he could not further comply with the council's request unless he had a copy of that list. Referred to the street committee.

On the proposed curfew ordinance and the ordinance permanently dedicating Pioneer square as a public park, was referred to the finance committee.
