INTERNATIONAL MINING CONGRESS

Session Will Commence This Morning.

THE DELEGATES ARE NOW POURING IN

Meeting of Committees Yesterday to Finish Arrangements.

The Committee on the Revision of the Mining Laws Completes Its Report—A Big Contest Expected Over It—Some Very Important Propositions Agreed Upon—The Programme Outlined—Officers of the Congress—Mineral Exhibit at the Hall of Relics.

The arrangements for the International Mining congress were all completed yesterday. There were meetings of several committees, the most important being those of the committees on revision of the mining laws and on programme.

REVISION OF MINING LAW.

The Report of the Committee Ready For Discussion. The committee on the revision of the federal mining laws, Hon. Charles J. Moore, chairman, met at the Templeton yesterday and adopted its provisional report, which is to be submitted to the International Mining congress at the Hall of Relics. This report contains 40 sections, some of which pertain to the location of coal

and iron, as well as of oil, and its provisions are clearly for the furtherance of the prospector, the miner and the investor. The leading features of the report are as follows: The elimination of the apex law; but in compensation for this loss of lateral rights the locator is permitted to locate claims of twice the original size, making 40 acres for each claim, and in any size or shape, using parallel lines, so long as the greatest length of the claim does not exceed one mile; but preferably in the form of a square, giving 1,220 feet to each side. The discovery and location of vein, lode or placer or other valuable mineral, including building stone or mineral oils, is permissible, but such discoveries may consist in the mere outcropping of the vein. Each location, to be complete, must be recorded within 90 days, and an official survey must be made of the same within this period, and no transfer shall be valid or legal until this is done.

The monuments, corner-stones or stakes marking the boundaries of a claim must be maintained and yearly proof of their maintenance shall be filed with the surveyor general and district recorder. All locations shall form a portion of the records of the surveyor general, as well as those of district or county recorders in the district or county in which the location is made, for the purpose of keeping duplicate records. The mineral or annual assessment work remains the same \$100; but this amount, yearly, can be deposited by the claim-holder in the surveyor general's office, to revert to the public land fund, or its equivalent in work can be done in the development of the claim; provided, however, that during the first year \$50 of the \$100 must be deposited with the surveyor general in payment for an official survey of the claim, and the proof of the deputy surveyor that the land is mineral bearing; the location notice to be filed for record and the survey to be made within 90 days after the location of the claim; the survey to be recognized as official when application for patent is made. No overlapping claims shall be allowed.

All legal questions are eliminated pertaining to cross or intersecting veins. Tunnels may be run for the development of any vein, or the discovery of deep placers or mineral deposits, and the owners of such tunnels shall have the right of possession of all veins discovered; but not within the surface boundaries of any claim located previously to the tunnel locations; and all right of way for the prosecution of such tunnels; the right of possession to such tunnels to be valid so long as work is carried on with two men for not less than 100 days in each calendar year.

THE REFUNDING BONDS.

Another Step Taken By the Council Finance Committee. Another step was taken by the finance committee, in conjunction with Mayor Clark and City Attorney Hall, last evening after the adjournment of the city council meeting, toward the floating of the \$500,000 worth of refunding bonds with which to repay the 5 per cent series issued in 1888. Had it not been determined to issue the refunding series, the administration would have been required to levy an additional tax to raise the first of ten annual installments of \$50,000 for a sinking fund. The finance committee has had several inquiries from eastern financial institutions for the proposed bond issue, and there is ample assurance

NEWS FROM THE FRONT

Another Officer of the Twenty-fourth Is Wounded.

LIEUT. ALBERT LAWS

CAPTAIN LASSITER, OF THE SIXTEENTH, ALSO SHOT.

Nothing Further Regarding Lieutenant Wells—Some Cheering News For the Ladies at the Fort From General Shafter—But One Officer Reported as Wounded Has Died.

The word from the front yesterday did not bring much additional news regarding wounded officers known here. It conveyed the intelligence, however, that Lieutenant Albert Laws, another popular officer of the Twenty-fourth, had been wounded at Santiago, this being the first announcement regarding him. Lieutenant Laws is a Maryland man and graduated from West Point in 1883, being assigned to

the Twenty-fourth. He was adjutant of Colonel Liscum's battalion on leaving here, but was made regimental quartermaster in the field. He is a single man and very popular with his brother officers.

CAPTAIN WEATHERILL. Captain Weatherill of the Sixth Infantry, reported killed, was stationed at Fort Douglas at one time, and is well known here.

CAPTAIN LASSITER WOUNDED. Captain William Lassiter was reported last night as among the wounded, which is another loss to the Sixteenth. Captain Lassiter was sta-

tioned here during all the time the Sixteenth was at Fort Douglas. He was detailed with the national guard upon its organization and served in that capacity after his regiment left, until the fall of last year, when he was promoted to captain and left for Fort Sherman. Captain Lassiter's duties were such that he resided in the city constantly for a long time and had a wider general acquaintance here than any officer in the Sixteenth. He was married to a Maryland lady last fall, soon after leaving Salt Lake. The nature of his wound is not stated.

LIEUTENANT WELLS. There is no further statement in the official list regarding Lieutenant Brian H. Wells, and the fact that his name is omitted from the official list gives room for the hope that he is unhurt.
