TOWN TALK.

Robert C. Neilson, brother of Davey Neilson, has succeeded the late Charles Burgess as night watchman on the two blocks on First, South, Second, Second and First West streets. He is an honest, sober, industrious man who can be trusted to his duty conscientiously and faithfully.

W. A. Helzheim, who has just graduated from the University of Michigan, has formed a law partnership with his brother, Frank Helzheim, the well-known attorney of Eureka, and will be found in his office in the Tribune, Mr. Helzheim recently arrived from the east and was a visitor in the city yesterday.

It is reported that frequent attempts have been made to break up the saloon on Paxton avenue, which runs from Second West between Ninth and Tenth South. The same individual attempts have been made and accuse people in a threatening manner. Last night, just after dark, a young woman was taken to the victim, but she escaped safely.

Edwin Southard, 25 West Seventh North, had a lively runaway about one block from his home Sunday evening. He was driving with his wife and three children when one of the shafts became loose, frightening the horses, which turned and ran. They were all bruised considerably, except the 2-year-old infant, which escaped unhurt. Dr. Linn was called.

Deputy Sheriff Hansen brought in from Murray yesterday and placed in the county jail a colored man named Joe Butt. He is charged with drunkenness and disturbing the peace. Butt was very obstreperous and gave the officer a great deal of trouble in bringing him to jail. He tore the officer's clothing to shreds, refused to walk a step and had to be carried from one street car to another.

Louis Klein, a junk dealer, was arrested by Deputy Sheriff Cummings yesterday on a warrant sworn out in Justice Nielsen's court by Mr. E. H. H. P. of Sugar House, who accuses the Italian with the theft of a carpet worth \$25 on July 25, while he was in the possession of some articles. Klein pleaded not guilty and will have a hearing at 10 a. m. Wednesday. He was released on a cash bond of \$25.

Ada L. Murt had an examination yesterday before Deputy Clerk of the Court Blair regarding her property. It was shown that Mrs. Murt was 22 years of age and that she had been deserted by her husband, who she had never seen since she was 16, and ever since the birth of her child she had been sick and that trouble and the condition of her mind had prevented her from working. She was found to be subject for the asylum and was committed to that institution.

Clayton L. Halper, the retired chairman of the board of public works, yesterday surrendered his office, under protest, to Engineer W. W. Ward's new chairmanship. It is not considered probable that Mr. Halper or any of the other department members of the board, whose term of office has expired, will make any effort to retain their positions. Chairman Keyser is awaiting the qualification of the new board, and will be busy with the matter of resurfacing streets and sidewalk pavements.

Fourteen men and three teams were employed to work on the new trench along the bed of Emigration creek from the tank to the pump. Three men were at work this morning, and everything will be rushed forward in the hope of having the 15-inch pipe line laid within two weeks. The 150 feet of vitrified pipe has been ordered by wire from Red Wing, Minn., at a cost of \$12,000. The cost of the expense of pumping at the pump will be about \$10,000.

The sum of \$250 in yearly premiums for fire insurance on the joint city and county building will be saved by reducing the amount of first-class from \$100,000 to \$100,000. The insurance rate is only \$3 per \$1000 yearly, but the committee on control yesterday decided to cut the insurance expenditure down one-third. Mayor Clark, City Councilmen Sidway and Armstrong and County Commissioners Armstrong, Hall and Hawkins concurred in the action. It was stated at the meeting that \$50,000 worth of insurance expired during the month of August, and in order to make the total risks paid for come within the \$100,000 limit, Councilman Sidway and Commissioner Hall, acting with City Auditor Swan, were constituted a committee to renew policies to the amount of only \$50,000. The insurance carried by the city and the county, independent of the \$50,000 carried by the city and county, has no reference to the insurance on the building.

BADGES FOR SOLDIERS

Utah Men Will Wear Them After the War.

A DEPARTMENT ORDER

ARTILLERYMEN IN MANILA ESPECIALLY FAVORED.

Will Wear An Artillery Emblem, Together With a Corps Badge—Utah Rough Riders Will Also Have a Special Badge—Caine's Cavalry May Not Be Included, Unless Attached to One of the Corps Now Operating.

When the Utah Johnnies come marching home, at the close of the war, all, with the possible exception of Captain Caine's cavalry, will have two or more badges to wear. An announcement was made in the press dispatches very recently to the effect that a lot of the cannon captured at Santiago would be melted and cast into badges for the Society of the Santiago. These badges to be given to members who participated in that campaign.

Now comes the war department with an order announcing that badges will be given men which shall be worn in front of the hat or on the center of the crown of the forage cap, by enlisted men and upon the left breast by officers.

THE UTAH ARTILLERYMEN. The artillerymen from this state will wear a badge composed of miniature crossed conical projectiles with a round shot in the center above the conical

shot. In addition to this they will also wear the badge of the Eighth corps, which is composed of two circles overlapping each other, one-third radius.

UTAH ROUGH RIDERS. The Rough Riders will wear the badge of the cavalry corps, consisting of the winged hoof, the badge of the
