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WOOL IS WEAKER

Western Banks Advising Speculative Holders to Sell.

PRICES ARE YIELDING

SALES IN EASTERN MARKETS ARE STILL LIGHT.

Market For Goods Is Disappointing—Iron and Steel Industry Is Still Booming and Prices Have Been Advanced By the Trusts—Activity In Wall Street.

New York, Jan. 27.—The G. D. Gun & Co. weekly review of trade will say tomorrow: The country is in a stronger position than a week ago. Remarkable strength in its industries is an important fact, but not the chief element. Public confidence in the business of the country and in its securities has been tested to an unusual extent by the sudden fall in stocks and the subsequent rise. Confidence in the value of wheat, corn and cotton has been shown by the markets and at rising prices the old world buys because it has to buy. The vast supply of unemployed capital has been shown impressively, and the new and startling independence of foreign money markets fixes attention. The lumber movement, unusually large for the season, with prices of local grades sharply advancing. Railroad earnings and tonnage have shown surprising gains. Treasury receipts are gaining and a vote on the peace treaty has been fixed for Feb. 6.
