Liberation of Spanish Prisoners. Spain, it is rumored, has determined to protest to the civilized world against the policy of the Americans in hindering the efforts of General Rios, Spanish commander in the Philippines, to liberate the prisoners.

DEATH OF EX-SENATOR WALSH. FAMOUS GEORGIAN STRICKEN BY NERVOUS PROSTRATION.

Has Been a Prominent Figure in Georgia—For a Quarter of a Century—An Editor of Repute. Augusta, Ga., March 12.—Hon. Patrick Walsh, ex-United States senator and mayor of Augusta, died at his residence today, after three months' illness, of nervous prostration. There had been little hope of his recovery, but his death was not thought to be a sudden one.

Havana, March 12.—A serious conflict between the police and people of Havana last night resulted in much shooting and clubbing. From thirty to fifty people were wounded, some seriously. Among the injured is Police Captain Estampes, formerly a colonel in the Cuban army.

GREAT COMMERCIAL WARS. FIGURES ON AMERICAN AND BRITISH TRADE.

Washington, March 12.—Ambassador Choate's recent remark that the United States and the United Kingdom would doubtless continue a friendly rivalry in regard to the world's commerce is quite justified by the latest figures on the commerce of the two countries as supplied by the treasury bureau of statistics. These show that the exports of domestic merchandise from the United States in the eight months ending with February amount to \$28,235,141, and those from the United Kingdom amount to \$28,235,141, in the calendar year 1898, the domestic exports from the United States amounted to \$64,328,329, below the billion dollar mark of the United States.

SPAIN WILL SETTLE CUBAN DEBT. London, March 20.—The Madrid correspondent of the Standard says: I am able to state that the government intends, so far as possible, to execute the national guarantee of the Cuban debt in 1899. These do not include the Cuban 6 per cent bonds issued in 1885, and \$15,000,000 of the 4 per cent bonds issued in 1890.
