

REAR PAINTING MACHINE ARMSTRONG GOES OUT

Well Known Salt Laker Is at Home Chairman County Commissioners Again, Resigned Yesterday.

TELLS OF HIS TRIP ABROAD ILL HEALTH THE CAUSE

VISIT WAS UNDERTAKEN PURELY FOR RECREATION. MUST HAVE ABSOLUTE REST FROM BUSINESS.

His Health Is Greatly Improved By His Vacation—Looks Better and Weighs More Than Ever Before In His Life—The English View of This Country's Policy.

Looking hale and hearty, A. W. McCune reached home yesterday afternoon from his visit to London and Paris. Mr. McCune says he is heavier than he ever was in his life and that he feels first rate. He looks as if he were twenty years younger than he is. Since he went to Europe more than two weeks ago, Mr. McCune has given no thought to business cares, and the result is that he feels like a new man.

There was a party of business connected with my trip," said the returned traveler. "It was undertaken purely for recreation. I had some business in New York and didn't know until I got there whether I would be able to cross the ocean or not. I wasn't well, though, and concluded that a voyage would be the best way to get away from business and take complete rest."

A Delightful Trip. "Every moment of our trip was delightful. There was quite a party of Salt Lake people on the steamer with us. It included Rob Walker, with his daughter, Mrs. Cheesman, and three sons, Dr. Mackay, Mr. McCune, Mr. McKinnick, Brig Eilerbeck, Fisher S. Harris, Waldemar Van Cott and myself. Senator Clark of Montana, with his son and daughter, returned on the same steamer with us.

"I talked casually with a great many of the people I met in London about our policy in the Philippines. They have the colonial idea over there and were almost a unit in declaring that the United States should hold on to the property it has acquired. I am not much prepared to say that my judgment is the best course to pursue.

"The islands are no doubt very valuable possessions, and with proper handling would be a great asset to us. We have enough room in this country to make homes for five times the present population, and the requirement of distant islands certainly makes us more vulnerable in time of war.

Must Stay For the Present. "However, we are in the Philippines now and we must stay for the present. The proper and rational solution of the difficulty is presented. The Englishmen I talked to, as I said, are strongly in favor of having the United States pursue the English colonial policy."

From London Mr. McCune and his party went to Paris. They spent a couple of weeks in the French capital and saw the sights very thoroughly. Mr. McCune had been there before and could show his companions all that was worth seeing. From Paris the party returned to London and then to New York, rounding up the corners of their sight-seeing.

Mr. McCune was not prepared to talk about railroad rates until yesterday. The affairs of the Utah & Pacific and the Salt Lake City Street Railway company, of both of which he is president, are the subject of some time to come. His health is now such that he can plunge into no end of work with his old-time vigor, and he expects to pick up the work he dropped there when he went away.

CONTINUE THE SPRAYING.

Frequent Showers Make Additional Spraying Necessary. Owing to the many rainstorms during the latter part of the month of May, much of the work of spraying has been lost, and, consequently, the work should be repeated at once, in order to catch the first crop of codling moth.

It is thought that the codling moth hatches only in the calyx of the apple is now pretty thoroughly exploded. Actual experience during the past five years in Utah has proved conclusively that there is well-nigh continuous hatching of codling moths throughout the season after the weather becomes warm at night—say after the first of June. The worms washed off the spray have also served to retard the hatching of the worms, thus giving the orchardist an even start with the insects. The attention of fruitgrowers is especially called to these facts at present, to the end that such work may be done as to accomplish results regarding the pest.
