WEST CABLE DEVELOPMENT.

Operations to Be Resumed On An Old Property.

(Special Correspondence.)

Tintic, June 9.—Preparations are being made for extensive developments

on the West Cable group, indicating from present appearances that arrangements being made will be complete within a few days. The work at great depths. The West Cable claims are situated not more than 2,000 feet from the Bullion-Beck ground in a southwestly direction, principal veins, valuable acreage. It is not by any means a new property or entirely an undeveloped one, having been located in 1862 by Messrs. Touching on an article published in The Herald the first of the present week wherein it was stated that the ore vein had widened to 20 inches or more, Mr. Cole replied that in substance it was practically correct in adding: "In fact, one time it was more than twenty inches wide, and just now the conditions indicate a still more favorable showing. The ore is being broken up, grown very hard and the vein is becoming more perpendicular and the ledge matter less jumbled up. UMA CONSOLIDATED.

The Vein Will Be Cut Before the End of the Week.

(Special Correspondence.)

Mammoth, June 8.—B. M. Cornish, superintendent of the Uma Consolidated, reports a very material change in the character of the rock at the bottom of the vein, now 100 feet from the tunnel level, or from the surface nearly 225 feet. There are a number of small mineral stringers or feeders, with a strike towards the vein, which is west of the shaftway, presumably about fifteen or twenty feet. Before the end of the week the working force will be directed to cut the vein, which is an immense quartz ledge, varying from twenty to thirty feet in width, from which point a drift north on the vein will be run to a point beneath the tremendous blowout surface showing.

The Uma ground joins the once famous Alaska group on the north, and is southeast of the Northern Spy and Garis, occupying a part of that territory. COPPER KING INCORPORATED.

Promising Morgan County Property To Be Developed.

Cosville, Utah, June 7.—Articles of incorporation for the Copper King Mining company were filed with the county clerk of Summit county, and have been approved by the board of trustees of Silver City, Utah; W. H. Croft of Peterson, Morgan county, Utah; G. Y. Bullock of Coalville, Utah. The officers of the company are: J. H. Stallings, president; G. Y. Bullock, vice president; Frank W. Croft, secretary and treasurer; J. H. Stallings and George Beard, directors.

The capital stock is placed at \$100,000, divided into 400,000 shares at the par value of 25 cents each, 100,000 shares being set aside as a working capital.

The property is located in the Morgan county mining district in Morgan county, Utah, and is composed of the following named mining claims: The Copper King, the Copper King Extension, the Copper Queen and the Copper Gold. Surface indications show fine samples of high-grade copper, mixed with native silver. A shaft has been sunk to a depth of fifty feet from the bottom of the present shaft, which is now in about twenty feet. Little Pittsburg traded freely, one block of 5,000 shares going at 1 1/2 cents. North Swansea suffered a heavy onslaught from the bears, and the best price that could be gotten for it was 1 1/2 cents. Daly's hundred shares of West Mountain Placer went at 40 cents.

San Francisco, June 9.—Captain P. Jansen and six men of the schooner Edward Parke arrived here today in a small boat having spent four days on the ocean at the mercy of the elements, which, fortunately, were unusually calm. Captain Jansen reports that on June 4 at 4 a. m. his vessel commenced to leak. All hands were kept at the pumps until nearly noon of the same day, when the water, which had gained on the pumps rapidly, filled the vessel, causing the captain to order his men into the small boat. Captain Jansen and his crew were supplied with a supply of water and provisions were stowed into the little boat which Captain Jansen ordered headed for San Francisco. The sea was calm, but a haze prevented their signals being seen by passing vessels until yesterday, when the ship was sighted. The British supplied the shipwrecked mariners with fresh provisions, but Captain Jansen declined an invitation to take refuge on the Nevada, as he was only thirty-five miles from this city. When the day broke this morning the little boat was off the Farallone islands. Captain Jansen soon made this harbor and reported to the owners of the Parke.
