Dusky Veterans Celebrated Anniversary of the Battle.

JOY AT FORT DOUGLAS

LIEUTENANT WHITE INSTRUCTED MEN TO JUBILATE.

Colored Soldiers Cheered for General Joe Wheeler and Their Troop Officers—Many Reminiscences of the Terrible Day Before the Trenches—Record of the Ninth.

Fort Douglas, Utah, July 1.—In commemoration of the noble conduct of the regular soldiers during the battle of San Juan hill, July 1, 1898, the post commander desires that the men of troop C, Ninth cavalry, celebrate that event in a manner most pleasing to themselves; and in order that they may do so, all duty, except the necessary guard and fatigue, is hereby suspended.

The posting of the foregoing notice at headquarters yesterday morning was the signal for the gallant troops at Fort Douglas to turn themselves loose for a day of celebration of the first anniversary of the battle of San Juan hill. The soldiers had been held

The troops rejoiced in the leadership of their brave officers, who are adored for their considerate treatment of them.

Troopers Reminiscent. As the day wore on, the troopers gathered in little groups and exchanged reminiscences.

Last September troop C was sent to Fort Duchesne, and ten days ago was transferred to this place to garrison Fort Douglas.
