

STOCKS IN THE EAST

Break in Prices at the Opening of New York Exchange.

SELLING QUITE ACTIVE

CALL LOAN RATES SHOWED DISPOSITION TO ADVANCE.

Severe Money Stringency Seems to Be Confined to New York and to a Narrow Speculative Circle in the Stock Market—No Further Movement of Gold.

New York, Oct. 3.—The disturbed condition of the foreign markets for securities and the upward tendency of foreign discounts caused a break in prices at the opening of the stock exchange here. The selling movement was quite active in the first hour and prices for the day in the majority of stocks were made in that time. There was some recovery later in the day in obscure quarters of the stock list. But prices generally were better by the end of the first hour. In the latter part of the day the small volume of offerings invited bidding up of prices. The sale of many stocks carried above that of last night, both in the railroads and in the industrial department. No large offerings were brought out by the advance and the upward bound of the money rate 4 per cent caused only a slight setback. The market was again and the closing was very firm in an almost stagnant market and only slightly below the best of the day. There is a mixture of gains and losses throughout the list.

There was considerable calling of loans by the early hours by national banks whose reserves are below the legal limit. But the money rate did not rise above 2 per cent during this period and at the opening money loaned at 4 per cent. Before the afternoon money was called back again to 2 per cent. It was after 2 o'clock when the rate sprang to 4 per cent and then it dropped back again before the close.

The urgent demand for money seems confined to the stock exchange and the small disbursements created by today's high rate indicate narrow limits of need there. The time loaned today, however, respond to the high rates for call loans, are not offered in large volume. Call loans at 4 per cent are being made, but showed some disposition to advance to 5 per cent. The severe stringency seems confined to New York and to a narrow speculative circle in the stock market. There is no evidence as yet of any disturbance of the course of general business for lack of money.

The action of the London and Berlin money markets today and the recent return of the Imperial Bank of Germany indicate an urgent need for money there, obviously to meet the demand for gold to New York is to be expected in the immediate future. The effect in yet apparent from the recent disbursement of dividends and interest, but some funds are expected to make their way from this source into the New York money market before many days. A hope is entertained in stock market circles that money market will be relieved by the treasury department in the absorption of surplus revenue as the principal cause of exhaustion of the country's money reserve.
