Celebrated Murder Case Set For December 18.

NO DATE FOR MILLS CASE

WILL PROBABLY COME UP IN JANUARY.

Smith, the Alleged Dynamiter, Will Be Tried On December 6 - Other Criminal Cases Set and Drawing of Jurors For Criminal Court - Taken Up On 22d.

Judge Cherry yesterday made a setting of criminal cases to be tried by Judge Norrell, commencing on Nov. 22, and continuing to the end of the year.

Stevens claims he gave the woman \$30 to pay her bill so she could leave, but when she came around before train time that afternoon he refused to give her the money and she was arrested.

ONE HUNDRED DOLLARS MISSING

Wells, Fargo Express Company Sued For That Amount. Justice Nielsen yesterday tried the case of David S. Scoville vs. Wells Fargo company. Scoville is suing for \$100, which he claims he lost in transmission, by the negligence of the company. On Jan. 19, 1905, he alleges that he sent through the express company \$100 to his wife, in Chicago. When she received the package there was only \$300. Depositions to that effect were read from Mrs. Scoville and her daughter, while the company was given Scoville for his \$100 by the company was introduced as further evidence. The company's defense was that they were not liable. W. D. Ritter argued for the complainant, and the defendant was represented by D. B. Entwistle. The case was taken under advisement until Saturday.
