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DESIGNS OF FRANCE

Would Cause Trouble Between England and Germany.

USE CUNNING DIPLOMACY FAILURE TO BRING ABOUT STATE OF BAD FEELING.

Emperor Declares That at No Time Has He Contemplated Joining Other Powers to Take Steps to Bring Great Britain to a Halt in South Africa.

(Copyright, 1900, by the Associated Press.) Berlin, Feb. 10.—An official of the German foreign office, who was questioned today by the correspondent of the Associated press regarding the utterances of Duke Albrecht of the Grand Duchy of Mecklenburg-Schwerin, to a French newspaper, said:

"It is true Duke Albrecht received the Eclair representative, but the latter evidently greatly exaggerated everything that he said to disturb the friendly relations between Germany and England. After Fashoda, France's most reasonable policy would have been to establish an understanding with England in regard to the colonial question.

JOE SIMPSON IN TROUBLE. The Newsboys' Grafter Exposed by the Police in Butte.

According to the Anaconda Standard the career of Joe Simpson, a reputed "graft" through the medium of the Newsboys' union, has come to an inglorious end in Butte. Simpson and a pal last Thursday night attempted to give a masked carnival ball in Butte for the benefit of the newsboys' and bootblacks' home, but before the music commenced to play the door receipts were attached to satisfy a debt due to musicians from a previous affair worked up by Simpson. To add to the trouble Simpson was arrested along with Albert Hogan for drunkenness. The Butte chief of police is quoted as saying that "Simpson invented to take the door receipts and skip out, as they have done in other places before. They worked the Salt Lake people this way for \$300, and have worked the Newsboys' and Bootblacks' union racket in nearly all of the western towns from here to Seattle. They have been imposing on the public long enough. They have no newblacks' home that we could ever find, and are nothing more than grafters."
