The Granite District, Oregon, Will Produce \$1,000,000.

Of the great gold belt in Oregon now attracting such universal attention, the Granite Gem, in a long descriptive article, says:

"The Granite mining district is located thirty miles by air line west of Baker city, and comprises all the territory west of the Blue mountains and the headwaters of the North Fork of John Day river. This territory is about twenty-five miles wide north and south, and extends fifty or sixty miles westward. Placer mining has been carried on in the Granite district for nearly forty years, and is a profitable industry. Over 500 claims have been located, and at present there are 100 partially developed mines and prospects, while the district has only been prospected on a haphazard basis.

"The ores of the district are free gold, which are reduced by stamp mills, and the base ores are concentrated and the concentrates are reduced by cyanide plants. The granite district is a rich field for the future, and it is believed that the district will produce \$1,000,000 worth of gold in the next few years.

COPPER FOR WAR PURPOSES.

England, Germany and France All in the American Market.

A New York special to the Boston Herald of yesterday quotes Jesse Lewisohn of Lewisohn Bros. on the copper market as follows: "London is now in the market for a large amount of American copper, thousands of tons of it being required for war purposes. Germany and France are also buying liberally. The demand from the latter country can be traced to the construction of telephone systems. Germans need it for traction and manufacturing purposes. It is estimated that one-third of the entire copper production of the country is now being exported."
