INDIAN SCHOOL SITE NAMED

FORT HALL INSTITUTION TO BE NEAR PRESENT AGENCY.

Several Buildings Will Be Erected at a Cost of \$75,000—Other Idaho News From Washington.

Washington, D. C., Aug. 15.—The new Indian school on Fort Hall reservation will be built five miles from the present agency, near "The bottoms."

The buildings will consist of two dormitories, school building, kitchen and mess hall, laundry and warehouse.

The cost of the buildings will be \$75,000.

Plans and specifications are now being prepared.

The postoffice at Pearl, Boise county, Idaho, has been moved one mile east.

Railroad postal service from Spalding to Stuart, Idaho, has been decreased one mile, omitting Spalding and starting the service from Pot Luck Junction.

Star postal service from Salsubria to Meadows, Idaho, has been increased three miles.

Sergeant John Tufty, Company M, Seventeenth Infantry, Wallace, Idaho, has been discharged from the service.

CROP CONDITIONS IN IDAHO.

(Special Correspondence.)

Boise, Idaho, Aug. 14.—The weekly crop bulletin of Idaho of the United States department of agriculture says:

The first part of the week was exceptionally cool, the temperature having fallen to within a few degrees of the normal.

The weather having become much warmer near the close of the week, reduced the yield of the crops.

Grain and grass: Practically no grain is standing in the southwest sections; harvest is making good progress in the central and northern counties.

Stock: Owing to the failure of many streams and springs, the result of light snowfalls in the mountains during the winter, the stock is suffering for water quite generally.

Exception in a few sections, grass seems to be rather short, and it is necessary to drive stock long distances away from good grass in order to secure water; this condition prevails principally in the central and eastern sections.

However, stock is reported in good condition.

FARMERS WANT THEIR CASH.

Robert B. Hall Arrested For Cheyenne Police.

Sacramento, Cal., Aug. 15.—Robert B. Hall, a fugitive from justice fleeing from South Omaha, was arrested in this city today upon the arrival of the train from the east.

He was arrested at the request of the chief of police of Cheyenne.
