SILVER IS THE ISSUE.

Positive Declaration Made by Senator Dubois at Ogden.

Ogden, Utah, Sept. 13.—Hon. Fred T. Dubois of Idaho came from the north today and was met by Hon. F. J. Cannon, whose guest he will be tonight and tomorrow. Mr. Dubois talked freely to a Herald reporter about the political situation, nationally and locally, regarding the silver issue.

"The only objection to the silver issue is that the Republicans, who like the Salt Lake Tribune, have gone back on their principles. It is the issue of the campaign. Indeed, it is the issue of the campaign for this is the first time in a national campaign that the Republican party ever declared flatly for the silver issue. Four years ago they were for international bimetalism; now they have thrown off even that pretense. The leading Republicans claim that the silver issue is the great issue."

Here Mr. Dubois mentioned a long list of the Republican national leaders to illustrate his statement concerning the imperialism issue in Idaho. Mr. Dubois said: "It is of considerable importance of course. Our candidate for governor and congress and most of the Republicans here are with us in this anti-imperialistic fight. The Republican party is a big figure, but of course the great issue is the silver issue."

Regarding the prospects for success in Idaho Mr. Dubois said: "We should carry the state by 10,000 majority."

To Receive Teddy. (Special Correspondence.) Ogden, Sept. 13.—A meeting of the Republican county committee was held last night, and arrangements discussed for the reception of Governor Roosevelt, on the occasion of his visit here Sept. 20. An effort will be made to organize a large number of rough riders. Governor Wells will meet Governor Roosevelt here, and excursions will be arranged over all the roads running into Ogden.

Discuss Campaign Plans. Ogden, Sept. 13.—A considerable number of leading Democrats met last evening with Chairman Hauer, and discussed plans for the coming campaign, as regards both the legislative and county ticket. About fifty were present, including ex-Governor Cannon, and a number of others who were formerly silver Republicans.
