

LITTLE ESTATE IS BIG

Basis of Distribution Approved By Judge Hiles.

MANY LEGACIES MADE

JOHN EVERILL ANXIOUS TO BE FREED FROM HIS WIFE.

Final distribution of the residue of the estate of the late James T. Little was ordered yesterday by Judge Hiles in confirming the report of the commissioners who were heretofore appointed to partition the estate. The report showed that the total sum of \$63,756.31 in real estate, cash, bank stock and sundry other investment securities remained on hand to be distributed to the surviving widow, the children and various other devisees named in the will.

To the widow, Alice S. Little, the commissioners awarded property of the kinds mentioned to the aggregate value of \$14,200. The allotment to Decker Little, a son of the decedent, was \$12,044.61. To Peramor T. Little and to Romania Little, each \$10,778.60, and to Fannie M. Little, the remainder of the minor heirs, \$10,766.55, each. Minnie Crow, a daughter of Mrs. Little, was awarded \$2,183.80.

These bequests provided for in the will were made: One share of Deseret Savings bank stock, valued at \$145, and cash to the amount of \$195 to James T. Little, an uncle of decedent, Edwin Decker, James Decker, Martha Little, Elizabeth Decker, Mamie Decker, St. Mark's hospital and St. Mary's hospital. To Charles Oliphant, William F. Stillson and Harriet D. Hanks, each \$125. To Charles F. Decker, \$133.75; to Margaret Decker, \$195, and to Maria D. Turpin, \$200.

EVERILL DIVORCE CASE.

Husband Declared He Did Not Want to Support His Wife.

Testimony in the divorce suit of Ruth Everill against John Everill was taken yesterday before Referee Blair and at the conclusion of the hearing the referee drew up a report recommending to the court that the decree of divorce be granted. In the stipulation it was provided that Mrs. Everill should have the custody of the youngest daughter, Margaret, the household furniture at the home, 714 East Thirteenth street, and \$100 in cash. The defendant said he did not care to longer support his wife and was willing that the allegation should stand that he had given his wife nothing for more than a year.

Children Inherit Property.

William C. Hubbard yesterday applied to the district court to be appointed guardian of the property interests of his three minor children, Gertrude, Nina B. and Dora A. Hubbard, residing at West Jordan. The petition set up that the minors are entitled to a share of the estate of the late Charles Sheppard, and after a proper showing Judge Hiles made the appointment upon the guardian giving a bond in the sum of \$250.

DALTON MINE IS SOLD

Go to St. Louis Parties For \$250,000.

FIRST PAYMENT MADE

PURCHASERS HAVE A YEAR TO CLOSE UP THE DEAL.

The property of the Dalton Gold Mining company passes into the hands of St. Louis capitalists tomorrow under an agreement which calls for the payment of no less than \$250,000, or on a basis of 50 cents a share, by the first day of September next year. The story of the deal, which has been kept exceedingly quiet, was received from the mine end of the string yesterday and there is no question of its accuracy. George F. Dalton, who is now at the mine, is the gentleman who represents the purchasers and he is the man who has just paid \$500 down to bind the bargain as well as giving a good and sufficient guarantee that \$2,000 more will be forthcoming by November 1. The real first payment on the purchase price is to be made on Dec. 1, or sixty days hence. What the amount to then be paid is could not be learned, but in view of the total figure, it is probably not less than \$25,000 and more than likely all of \$50,000.

JUDGE POWERS GOES EAST

Called to New York Yesterday By the Death of His Father.

News reached Judge O. W. Powers by telegraph yesterday morning of the death of his father, Josiah W. Powers at Palmyra, N. Y., at the advanced age of 82 years. Judge Powers left for New York on the 6:40 train last night in order to be present at the funeral services. He will be away from Utah about eight days. The news of his father's demise came without warning to Judge Powers. Only recently he had received word from his sister that the old gentleman was enjoying excellent health. However, he was attacked by heart trouble and expired at a moment when his death was least expected. The dead man was born in New Hampshire and for many years was a farmer. He moved to New York at an early age, and had lived there ever since. Judge Powers' wife and son Roger are now in New York, but not at Palmyra. He has wired them to meet him there on his arrival.
