STREET CAR LINES MAY CONSOLIDATE

Offer Made For Rapid Transit Control. FROM STOCKHOLDERS OF SALT LAKE LINE Believed That Proposition Will be Accepted.

The consolidation of the street railway companies of Salt Lake, a consummation that has been hoped for a number of times in the past, has been nearly accomplished on a half-dozen different occasions, in nearer perfection today than it has ever been before in the history of the roads.

TELLS HOW MISS MORRISON KILLED HER RIVAL.

Witness Says Mrs. Castle Pleaded For Her Life While Being Slashed With Razor.

Edorado, Kan., June 19.—After only two days of testimony taking, the trial in the case of Jessie Morrison, on trial for the murder of Mrs. Olin Castle, rested this afternoon.

When Miss Morrison took the stand in December last, to tell in her own defense of the fatal quarrel with her rival, she testified that Mrs. Castle had called her to her house and started the quarrel.

Mr. Spangler testified to hearing these words: "Get off of me, Jessie Morrison; you are killing me."

San Francisco, June 19.—Ever since mention was made several months ago that a secret search had been made of the records of Sacramento county to determine if there was a record of the adoption of Princess Hatzfeldt by the late Collis P. Huntington, there have been persistent rumors that the princess has in contemplation a contest of the railroad builder's will.

Whether this dissatisfaction will materialize in a lawsuit is yet to be seen. There is a clause in the will that says that any one making a contest shall be cut off from all shares in the estate.

Mr. Clara Prentice, mother of the princess, asserts, it is stated, that she signed a document relinquishing her daughter, and that Huntington legally adopted the child.
