

PASSING OF WALKER HOUSE

Famous Hospitality to be Converted into Business Block.

HAS INTERESTING HISTORY

ENTERTAINED PRESIDENTS, EMPERORS AND PRINCES.

The passing of the Walker house—a weather beaten monument to the first effort to conduct a modern, first-class hotel in Salt Lake City—has attracted the attention of the immediate present to its history. The "old Walker," as it is affectionately known to veteran citizens of half a dozen adjoining states, is doomed as a hotel. This information has been given forth by its owner, David Keith. As soon as the present legal tangle is adjusted and the Dudley lease terminated, the old structure will undergo radical repairs and emerge from the hands of the contractor as a remodeled modern business structure.

What the future has in store for the property and the specific purpose to which it will be assigned, Mr. Keith has not determined. It is possible that it will be converted into an office building, with store rooms on the ground floor.

The old main street caravansary is not without a past—a history replete with incidents that marked epochs in the development of the city. It is one of the American continent can boast of entertaining many celebrities of a period of two decades ago, when it was in its prime and its proprietor, David Keith, was its proprietor. Erected early in the century, it reaped into popularity immediately and was regarded as the pride of the intermountain section. Presidents, mighty warriors, the actors and actresses of world fame at the time, even royalty was entertained there. Business meetings of importance were carried on within its walls, the social functions of the hour were held there. At one period a large part of the life of the city centered about the hotel.

Then came changes. Hotel architecture made mighty strides and other and newer houses slowly carried off the laurels of the Walker. With changing times, the character of the guests in the general tone of the surroundings, until from the "smart" gathering place of Salt Lake City, the hotel developed into a popular rendezvous for country visitors and persons seeking quiet retreat quarters, rather than the glare and bustle of a modern hotel.

Some Notable Guests. Some few of the celebrities who have enjoyed the hospitality of the old Walker were Presidents Garfield, Grant, Hayes, Cleveland, and McKinley, emperor of Brazil, and his imperial suite found apartments there on the occasion of the American tour of that illustrious monarch. Prince Napoleon in France, royal tourists, politicians, in fact the distinguished local visitors of a quarter of a century ago all made the house their home. An example is found in a casual review of the names of those who held there, 2 and 1576, wherein the following signatures are found:

General Ben Harrison. U. S. Grant. John Sherman. General and Mrs. Sheridan, U. S. A. General Cutler, wife and servant, U. S. A. Captain D. M. Lee, wife and child. General W. T. Sherman. J. D. Cameron, Secretary of War. John Brown, Scotland.

LEFT FORTUNE TO CHARITIES

Report Concerning Estate of Patrick Phelan.

PROPERTY WORTH \$100,000 BELIEVED HE LEFT IT TO CATHOLIC CHURCH AND CHARITIES.

There is much speculation concerning the contents of the will made by the late Patrick Phelan nearly six years ago and deposited in the hands of Judge W. C. Hall, who is now holding it pending a meeting and action by the executors named to act with him in carrying out the wishes of the deceased. It is estimated that Mr. Phelan had left a fortune of something like \$100,000.

The fact that he had left a will came as a surprise to his closest friends, none of whom was in any way familiar with his business affairs. Now comes the assertion from those with whom he was connected in years that the Catholic church, or charities associated with the church, will be remembered in the disposition of the estate with generous liberality, in support of it is the fact that the only known living relative of the deceased is a nephew in California, who was not high in Mr. Phelan's favor, and also the circumstance that he named Bishop Scanziani, his former business partner, and who since the death of Mr. Phelan has been in local philanthropic work. While the details of the will are not known, it is not generally known that through his unostentatious and quiet life, Mr. Phelan was furnished with fuel in winter and food in summer. These acts of benevolence were carried through the agency of Bishop Scanziani, or other priests, more frequently the latter. The identity of the beneficiary never knew the identity of the donor.
