

OFFICIALS TOGETHER AT HILTON, CONDIE AND DOOLY STATED FOR RETIREMENT.

SHEETS FOR POLICE CHIEF SPENCER MAY SUCCEED WATERMASTER CONDIE.

There is to be a shake-up in Mayor Thompson's official family right after the inauguration Jan. 1, and the conviction is fixed in the minds of most people that Chief of Police Hilton, Watermaster Peter Condie and John E. Dooly, chairman of the board of public works, are to walk the plank.

Thomas H. Hilton, the chief of police, will be the first to go, and his going means a general upheaval in the police department. He is now appointed by Mayor John Clark and held over under the present administration.

It is understood that Governor Wells is pulling hard for Captain Burt, and he is given out during the campaign that he is a number of months away from working for Mayor Thompson on the understanding that Burt was to be appointed to this place.

Spencer to Succeed Condie. Peter Condie is another official who will be ousted. He is now in the city nearly every day by those close to the mayor that Condie's successor has been picked out in the person of George Spencer, who now occupies the position of sewer inspector in the city engineer's office.

As to John E. Dooly, chairman of the board of public works, the statement is given out that Mr. Dooly is to go at the opening of the year. This is because of the fact that he has no other work to do, and the city engineer has marked Condie for slaughter.

The Republican place-hunters are not overlooking the fact that the city treasurer, George Wilson is after the other place, Wilson demands the place because of the work he did in the campaign and the fact that he has the pressure he can command upon Nye to bring him to time; on the other hand, Nye is holding back, and this early state of the game there is no telling who will win out.

"JOE THE TURK" HIS SISTER.

Famous Salvation Army Leader, Who Has Been Mobbed in America and Imprisoned in Turkey, Will Preach in Salt Lake—Speaks Six Languages.

Joe the Turk, or Adjutant J. Garabed, one of the pioneer Salvation Army workers of the Pacific coast, and a champion of army principles of world-wide reputation, is a visitor in Salt Lake and will remain here three days as the guest of the local army corps. Adjutant Garabed, who is probably the most unique character in the Salvation Army, arrived yesterday morning from Chicago, bringing with him all of his rich Oriental finery and curios. First among these paraphernalia is his wonderful "gospel umbrella," which is the most famous umbrella in the world. From beneath its richly patterned folds, over which a small American eagle spreads its wings and a small United States flag flings its stars and stripes, there comes a voice which has preached the gospel in almost every country in the world, and the famous Turk says that to insure himself a royal welcome almost everywhere he goes to preach it is only necessary to raise his "gospel umbrella." For eleven years past Adjutant Garabed has been traveling throughout the United States and the Old World, holding special Salvation Army meetings, and is now on his way back to England, where he has become an army member eighteen years ago.

Adjutant Garabed is the guest of Staff Captain W. H. Taylor, and his first address at the Salvation Army hall on Commercial street tonight. After the meeting he will deliver an address at the First Baptist church at 3 p. m., and on Sunday and Monday nights he will deliver addresses at the army hall. "Joe the Turk" speaks six languages and is a fluent talker as well as a musician of considerable ability. He sings, plays the saxophone, the cornet and the clarinet.

JUDGE ARNOLD UNDER ARREST

Mrs. Johnson Charges Attorney With Embezzling \$1,430.

RAISED MONEY ON MORTGAGE ARNOLD SAYS SHE OWED HIM THE MONEY.

On complaint of Emma Johnson, a widow living at West Jordan, Judge W. S. Arnold was arrested last evening on a warrant charging him with having embezzled \$1,430 from the complainant. The accused was taken before Justice Dana Smith, who fixed his bond, pending preliminary hearing, at \$1,500. Joseph Oberdorfer and J. H. Palmer qualified as sureties and Judge Arnold was released on his own recognizance. The complaint alleges that about Oct. 1 of this year Arnold embezzled \$1,430 in cash from Mrs. Johnson while he was acting as her attorney and trustee, she having entrusted to him the money which he is alleged to have misappropriated to himself. Only a few days ago Mrs. Johnson raised \$1,500 for the purpose of adjusting her affairs some few months ago by giving a mortgage upon her farm, the difference between the sum named in the mortgage and the money claimed to have been embezzled by Judge Arnold representing the expense of securing the same. Only a few days ago it was claimed by the widow, she received notice from F. E. McGurrin & Co., the investment bankers, that the interest due on the mortgage was \$1,430. Coming to the city to attend to the matter, and learning that none of the money which she let her attorney deposit with the bankers for her remained on deposit, she started an inquiry with Attorney G. H. Backman, who advised her to invoke the criminal law against Judge Arnold. Mrs. Johnson declared to the county attorney that she made a demand on Judge Arnold for her money but was refused. She had no other money, and that the amount of money claimed by the mortgage went to pay off her indebtedness to him for services as legal adviser. Mrs. Johnson further stated that she had paid the mortgage, and besides had presented him with a call worth \$1,430 and a bond of \$1,500.

Judge Arnold's Statement.

Judge Arnold stated last evening that he had no doubt of his ability to disprove the charge that he had embezzled any sum whatever from Mrs. Johnson. He owes her over \$400 now, he added. This affair runs through a number of lawsuits in which I have acted as counsel for Mrs. Johnson, and I have expended money for her and for her attorney, and I have received every cent and more that I have charged her. The fact is, that she is easily influenced by persons who have not half the regard for justice that I have shown. No attorney could have done better service for her than I have rendered for her. Judge Arnold admitted that he had received the money claimed to have been embezzled from Mrs. Johnson, but said the \$1,430 applied on his fees and that the remainder had been paid by her to reimburse him for money paid out for her. She raised the mortgage voluntarily, the judge declared. The services rendered by Judge Arnold to Mrs. Johnson consist, he said, of carrying the administration of her husband's estate through the courts, recovering from her brother-in-law, Anthony Schuler, money and other personal property of her deceased husband, defending to a successful issue last Saturday the suit of her minor son, Richard, against her father, and her father, Peter Johnson, on his part, and bed two years ago last September, and associating with Attorney Joseph T. Richards, who has been in the suit which Mrs. Johnson has filed against Schuler for slander and demanding \$50,000 damages for accusing her of adultery with her husband and bearing a bad reputation. MRS. LYNCH'S INSANITY Sent to Asylum Because She Smashed Furniture and Now Sues Her Husband.

A suit was filed in the district court at Coalville yesterday that will be of peculiar interest to many of the older residents of Park City. It is an action brought by Mrs. Margaret Lynch against her husband, Patrick Lynch, a freeman at the Ontario, for separate maintenance. The complaint sets forth that the parties were married at Park City, February 1884, and in 1889, Mrs. Lynch alleged that she was stricken with pneumonia and removed to a Salt Lake hospital. On her recovery she went to her home at Ontario, where another woman had been installed in her home. This so incensed her that she demolished the furniture and for that act was adjudged insane and sent to the asylum at Provo for one year. On her release, she was in fear of bodily harm should she return to her home at the Park, and went to her husband at Ontario, where she remained with him until a few days ago, when she arrived in this city. SOLD TOBACCO TO MINORS.

Proprietor of a Grocery Store Placed Under Arrest. J. E. Healy, the proprietor of a grocery store near the corner of State and Third South streets, was arrested yesterday afternoon on a charge of selling tobacco to minors. Officer Simpson happened to pay a visit to a vacant lot in the rear of Healy's store late in the afternoon and found some half-grown boys and a man puffing hand-made cigarettes with the air of veterans. When they saw the officer the lads ran, but he caught two of them, who gave their names as Rex Moore and Clark Doolittle. The boys told the officer that they had bought the tobacco from Healy's, and Officer Simpson happened to see the man who had arrested them. The store man did not deny that he had sold the tobacco to the boys, but he thought they had wanted it for their father, and not for themselves. Healy was released on \$10 bail.
