

SOUTH TEMPLE WILL BE PAVED

Enough Property Owners Petition for Improvement.

COST TO BE \$14 FRONT FOOT

PRELIMINARY ACTION TAKEN BY THE COUNCIL

Unmistakable assurances were revealed at last evening's session of the city council that the proposition to pave South Temple street from Eagle gate to the Oregon Short Line passenger depot would be carried through during the coming summer...

As much as the petitioners represent 2,874 feet of frontage, which is nearly 700 feet in excess of the frontage which would be required should a price be paid from two-thirds of all of the property in the proposed paving district...

President Smith Signs.

The first signer of the petition is President Joseph F. Smith of the Mormon church, representing 1,515 front feet, which will be taxed at the rate of \$14 per foot. The George G. Cannon association is down for 355 feet. Other signatories are Z. C. M. L. Zion's Savings bank, George Romney, Taylor Romney, Armstrong company, D. L. Davis, Lambert Paper company, heirs of James T. Little, N. W. Clayton and J. F. Holmes, each signing for their respective holdings, ranging from 178 to thirty-three feet.

REPORT OF TREASURER.

W. H. Dale Makes Statement of Receipts and Disbursements.

Treasurer W. H. Dale yesterday submitted his report of the receipts and disbursements of the county for the month of December. The showing is as follows:

City's Vital Statistics. The population of Salt Lake increased sixty-six during the month of December, there being 129 births as against sixty-three deaths. Of those who died thirty-four were males and twenty-nine females. Sixty-eight males were born and sixty-one females. In December, 1901, there were seventy-four deaths and eighty-nine births. Contagious and infectious diseases were reported as follows: Diphtheria, 49 cases; scarlet fever, 101; measles, 70; typhoid fever, 16; smallpox, 6; chicken pox, 1; membranous croup, 1. There were 7 deaths from diphtheria, 4 from scarlet fever, 2 from typhoid fever, and 1 from measles. There were 126 fumigations for contagious diseases. Thirty-two examinations of culture tubes for diphtheria were made and 19 were found to contain germs.

County Board Matter.

The commissioners yesterday ordered a refund of the taxes assessed against the Mormon church property in the Fifth ward. The refund was also given to redeem the property from a tax sale of 1896.

Telephone orders were placed in the recorder's office and clerk's office. The report of the superintendent of the infirmary shows: Persons admitted during the month of December, 19, discharged, 7; number of inmates on Dec. 31, 85.

Promise to Abolish Grade Crossings.

Boston, Jan. 2.—W. Murray Crane took the oath of office today as governor of Massachusetts for his third term. The attendance on the ceremony was the largest assembled for a similar occasion in many years. The inaugural address, treated of state matters exclusively. One of the principal recommendations of the governor was the appropriation of \$5,000,000 for carrying on the work of abolishing grade crossings, the money to be expended at the rate of \$500,000 a year.
