

BROTHER OF THE GERMAN RULER

Prince Henry of Prussia to Have a Cordial Reception.

TO REPRESENT THE KAISER

AT THE LAUNCHING OF THE EMPEROR'S NEW YACHT.

New York, Jan. 12.—During this week plans will be considered for the reception of Prince Henry of Prussia, brother of Emperor William, who will land here next month to witness the launching of the Kaiser's new yacht. The prospect now is that from the arrival of the prince in New York waters will date a series of public receptions, fetes and kindly greetings of an international character, such as have been paralleled in this country only during the visit of the Prince of Wales, now king of England, forty years ago, and when a welcome was extended eleven years later to the Grand Duke Alexis, brother of the czar of Russia.

Many German-American citizens, including Jacob A. Cantor, president of the borough of Manhattan, and former Mayor Schieren of Brooklyn, today discussed plans for the prince's reception. Mr. Schieren said: "I think Prince Henry should be welcomed appropriately by the city and the nation, not only because of the graceful courtesy on the Kaiser's part in inviting Miss Roosevelt to christen his new yacht, but more especially in view of the very pleasant relations existing between this country and Germany. Whatever the German-American citizens may decide to do will be done in harmonious co-operation with the city at large."

Washington, Jan. 12.—The announcement that Prince Henry of Prussia, brother of Emperor William, will come to the United States at an early date already has caused much interesting speculation as to the details of his reception. The programme for his entertainment will be an elaborate one, appropriate for his high station. He will be met at New York by representatives of President Roosevelt.

An officer will be detailed from the army and one from the navy to arrange for the convenience of the prince to come to the city. The prince will be accompanied by his wife, who will arrive in the German navy, and when he arrives at New York he will be greeted by a salute of twenty-one guns, which is the same as a presidential salute. He may make an address at the launching of the imperial yacht, which is to be christened by Miss Roosevelt, and it is not improbable that President Roosevelt may attend the launching and respond to the prince's address.

On his arrival in Washington Prince Henry will be received by the president and invited to become the guest of the nation. Whether he will stay at the German embassy is not known. His trip will be returned in person by Mr. Roosevelt, who will invite him to a dinner, where there will also be the most prominent American citizens. Everything will be done to make Prince Henry's visit a pleasant and memorable one.

The imperial yacht Hohenzollern will also be given a cordial reception. It is possible that the North Atlantic squadron will find it itinerant out short and that it will be ordered to receive the yacht at sea, according to its position, and take its share of doing honor to the prince of Prussia.

WOMEN NOT BARRED OUT.

Have a Legal Right to Serve in Congress if They Can Get Elected. (Special Correspondence.) Washington, Jan. 8.—Pennsylvania avenue, and, in fact, all of the downtown business streets, were absolutely deserted by strolling pedestrians on Sunday afternoons, however fine the weather. The stay-at-home men were valued among Washingtonians on the Sabbath, and those of them that did find their way to the air took the broad up town residential thoroughfare for walking purposes. Not only were the streets empty, but Sunday afternoon sees Pennsylvania avenue all the way from the treasury to the capitol positively crowded with well-dressed and comfortable looking folks out for the air. There is no way of accounting for this change, but that it has taken place is apparent to everyone who has lived here for any length of time. There are few American cities the business streets of which are thronged on Sundays by strollers, with the probable exception of New Orleans, where the people pour out on all the streets, business and residential, on Sundays.

Just now Washington is interested to find out what manner of men these new cabinet officers are in their personal characteristics. Those who have to meet the heads of these departments in a business way are interested in knowing the personality of the new secretary of the treasury and postmaster general. Washington society is interested in the domestic and social character of the men and their wives, and millions of American citizens who are interested in every phase of official life in Washington are curious to learn the bearing of these new officials in the glare of society at the national capital. Probably no two men in the United States are more indifferent to the figure they will cut in society than Governor Shaw and Mr. Payne. The records of their lives denote the fulfillment of President Roosevelt's idea of "strenuous life." Their success and usefulness testify to their devotion to business and indifference to forms, ceremonies and social exactions. They are antipodal to the standard which society leaders might prescribe for a cabinet officer.

Congressman William Casworth Smith of Michigan is learning that it requires some courage for a man as

well as for a woman to come out uncompromisingly for equal suffrage. He has recently declared his belief that women ought to be elected to congress, and as a result is getting well roasted by the press and his fellow members. The Washington Post agrees with him, but advises that he begin by obtaining the suffrage for the women of his own state, and then one can be sent to congress from Michigan. A good suggestion, but in that case Mr. Smith might be displaced, women could be represented in the four states where they have the franchise, but they will not be doing as the masculine candidates for the office can prevent it. The elevator, in which were stored 300,000 bushels of barley, has been destroyed with its contents. The loss, it is said, will be near \$500,000.

Depew will not go to Washington tomorrow as planned, but will stay over until he has had a conference with the directors of the New York Central railroad regarding the accident in the tunnel last week. CARNEGIE SELLING BONDS. Huge Blocks of "University" Steel Trust Securities. (Chicago American.)

University activity has been noticed in Wall street, where the steel corporation bonds. One sale was made by Adrain H. Miller & Co., at auction, at 115 1/2. It is reported in Wall street that several large blocks have also recently changed hands.

None of the large bond houses profess any knowledge of the reported sale by Andrew Carnegie of the \$10,000,000 of the bonds of the University of the United States as an endowment fund for a higher university, but certainly there has recently been some large sales made. It is stated positively that a life insurance policy for \$500,000 at a price said to have been slightly above 14. Other investments in various kinds, which, in the aggregate, have equaled an amount of bonds which could not possibly be from any other source than from Andrew Carnegie. The prices have varied somewhat, but a major part of the transactions have been made at 14. This price the amount which Mr. Carnegie would realize on the sale of the bonds, if he were to sell them to the United States government, in order to comply with the suggestion of President Roosevelt that the proposed gift should be made in cash instead of in bonds. The acceptance of the latter might be embarrassing to the government, particularly in case of an effort made to attack trusts, which on technical grounds might bring the United States steel corporation before the courts.

On Patterson. (New York Times.) Thomas Patterson, the new senator from Colorado, is principally known in his state for the frequency with which he changes his politics. Within the last eight years he has been a Democrat, then a Populist, and then a Democrat again. Besides supporting independent local tickets at various times in Denver, in Washington he has been a supporter of the story of something that happened in Denver once a young and green politician came to him and begged him to canvass the election district in which Mr. Patterson lived. He rang the bell of the magnificent Patterson home at the corner of Pennsylvania and Eleventh avenues, and of the stable servant who appeared demanded the name of the occupant. "Mistah Tom Patterson," responded the colored boy. "What are his politics?" asked the canvasser, adhering strictly to his list of "tinted questions." "Why, laws-a-massy, boss," said the serving man, "he has been a Democrat, but he has been a Populist since breakfast."

FRENCH MINISTERS OPEN THE ELECTORAL CAMPAIGNS WITH ECCLAT

St. Etienne, France, Jan. 12.—The opening of the ministerial electoral campaign here today proved an unqualified success. The weather was fine and cold. Since yesterday morning the camp of the 'Loire has been filled with the people from the surrounding districts and numerous visitors from Paris and other parts of France.

Besides M. Waldeck-Rousseau, the French premier, the ministers of war, marine, the colonies and commerce were in attendance, as were the principal military and civil officers of the department. Today's ceremonies included visits to the hospital and other local institutions of St. Etienne. The town was elaborately decorated with flags. M. Waldeck-Rousseau and the other ministers were greeted with cheers and cries of "Vive la republique!" "Vive la government!" and "Vive Loubet."

Upon leaving one of the hospitals, which was founded in 1680, the French premier said: "It is not a hospital that I have just visited; it is a vestibule to the morgue.
