

Y. M. C. A. PLANS NEW BUILDING

Structure to Cost \$100,000 is Under Consideration. ANNUAL MEETING IS HELD REPORT IS READ ON THE WORK OF THE YEAR.

The Young Men's Christian association is planning the erection of a new building at about \$100,000. The lease on the present quarters will expire May 1, and it will be necessary to make new arrangements. While it is possible to erect a new building completed by that time, it is expected that the new structure can be well under way within a short time.

General Secretary Coming. Charles K. Ober, general field secretary of the Y. M. C. A., will arrive in Salt Lake in about a week, and some of his duties will probably be done while he is in the city.

Report of Mr. Axton. The directors will meet the first Friday in February to elect officers. Some action may then be taken on the selection of a secretary for the next year, as Secretary John T. Axton expects to resign. No choice has yet been expressed. At the meeting last evening, Secretary Axton read his report of the work of the year, as follows:

It might well be said that the Young Men's Christian association is not a church, though it saves souls; it is not a college, though it educates; it is not a sanitarium, though it promotes health and cleanliness; it is not an inn or comfort, although it does furnish comfort and pleasure. It is a young man's home down town, where opportunity is afforded for recreation, education, physical training and religious instruction. It is one of the great successful agencies in the solution of the problems in the life of city young men.

The specific object of the Young Men's Christian association is training for the welfare of young men, which it does through a variety of channels in a business-like way. Any man of good moral character is welcome to members, but much of the work is outside of those who belong.

While the equipment of the association is not ideal and really unworthy to represent our city, it is being used to the greatest possible advantage as is shown by the fact that there were over 6,000 visits to the rooms in 1901.

Night School.—To meet a practical need of employed young men and working boys' instruction in the following branches: Grammar, spelling, arithmetic, bookkeeping, shorthand and penmanship. During the evening and fall terms of 1901, thirty-nine different men and boys took advantage of this department.

The association cannot be shown in figures or adequately described. A wide influence for good has been exerted in extending a helping hand to men in need. No man has applied to the association whose case has not been investigated by men of experience in such matters and the proper relief applied.

Nearly every mail brings letters from far away homes in which there are loving hearts anxious about you. No man who goes astray in the great west. We are asked to locate them, get them on their feet and send them home. It is pleasing to report some measure of success in this work.
