Salt Laker Says He Is Heir to a Great Estate.

A QUEER TALE OF REVENGE

WEALTHY BACHELOR DISPOSES OF PROPERTY IN ODD WAY.

William B. Cronk, an employe of the Utah Light & Power company of this city, claims to be one of the heirs to the estate of \$8,000,000 held in trust by the Holland government, to which Mrs. Channey M. Depey and a number of other heirs in this country are trying to establish their right.

This great estate has grown from a nest egg left more than 100 years ago in trust to the Holland government by an eccentric old Hollander, who, to realize his two poor brothers, left the money to be held by the government for 100 years, and then divided among the descendants of the two brothers.

Split During the Revolution.

The story of how this great fortune came to be where it is, and why some of the most distinguished people of the American continent are attempting to establish their claims to a portion of it, is that Casper Cronkling, an eccentric old bachelor, who, to realize his two poor brothers, left the money to be held by the government for 100 years, and then divided among the descendants of the two brothers.

Heirs Are Adversely For.

A number of years ago provisions in the will for the distribution of the estate became ineffective, and the Holland government advertised for the heirs to the estate. Scores of claims have flowed into the government, but the claimants have been unable to establish their right to the estate.
