LONDON, Feb. 8.—A dispatch to the Pall Mall Gazette from Dublin declares that the "firmly rooted belief in influential circles is that nothing short of a revolution is meant by the United Irish League, and that the advocates of constitutional methods are slowly but surely giving way to the strong physical force section."

The correspondent adds: "Irishmen who have just returned from the United States aver that no support will be given to the disloyal cause unless the discussions and scenes in parliament give place to something more active in Ireland itself."



NEW PLAN TO WATER LANDS SHYLOCKS CAUSE FAMINE

Representative Lacey Wants Experiments Begun in Order to Show the Feasibility and Necessity of Irrigation—Mondell and Newlands Oppose It.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 8.—Representative Lacey of Iowa was given a hearing today before the house committee on irrigation in support of his bill making an appropriation for an experimental irrigation system, to be constructed at some place designated by the secretary of the interior.

SHYLOCKS CAUSE FAMINE

Returned Missionary Declares it is Folly to Send Shiploads of Wheat to India as Plenty of Cereals is Grown There.

AKLAND, CAL., Feb. 8.—Dr. Maud Allen, formerly of Portland, Ore., a medical missionary from India, who arrived today on the steamer Doric, after an absence of seven years, says that it is foolish for the American people to send ships full of wheat for the succor of the famine sufferers, because there never is any real dearth of cereals in that empire.

BREVET BRIGADIER GENERAL

PREFERMENT MISSED BY CHIEF EXECUTIVE OF THE NATION.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 8.—The president has approved, with one notable exception, all the recommendations made by the army brevet board, of which General MacArthur was president, for the bestowal of the brevet rank on all the officers of the army who rendered especially meritorious services during the war with Spain, and in the subsequent campaigns in the Philippines and China.

LION ATTACKS WOMAN TAMER

Madame Schell, Who Has Been in Salt Lake, is Injured.

(Special to The Herald.) Los Angeles, Feb. 8.—Mrs. Schell, lion tamer at the Chutes, was dragged out of the cage torn and bleeding in the middle of the performance this afternoon. Juliette, a trained lioness, snubbed in her corner and would not take part in the programme, but vigorous applications of the woman's whip drove the beast out.

Madame Schell will be well remembered by visitors at the Laguna a few seasons ago, who saw her perform her daring feats with her trained animals, and shuddered for her safety.

RAWLINS QUESTIONS TAFT ABOUT THE FRIARS

Washington, Feb. 8.—During the hearing of the Philippine commission today Senator Rawlins asked Governor Taft concerning the holdings of the friars. The governor said he thought the general opinion as to their wealth and holdings of the friars had been greatly exaggerated.

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SUICIDE OF POLICEMAN.

New York, Feb. 8.—Bartholomew P. Clune, a New York City policeman, committed suicide today by shooting, rather than answer charges which had been preferred against him. It was alleged against him that on the night of Feb. 3 he went into a cigar store and without provocation abused a number of young men in this store.

American Newspaper in Manila.

New York, Feb. 8.—A Republican newspaper controlled by Americans will be established at Manila, according to the Herald. At present there is no single American newspaper in the islands. The Daily American having been sold recently to an English syndicate.
