REFUSE TO LET ROOMS

Householders Give Scant Aid to Elks—Floats For Convention.

The Elks' committee on accommodations is somewhat discouraged over the antipathy encountered by the agents who are soliciting rooms to be rented to convention visitors. Usually when a solicitor goes to a house in the residence district, according to Chairman Homer, he is greeted with the flat-footed statement that no rooms can be secured there. It takes the agents from a half to three-quarters of an hour to talk the proprietor into an agreement to let a couple of rooms. As this time is being paid for at the rate of 50 cents an hour, the accommodation feature threatens to be extremely expensive.

Bank Clearings Compared.

A year ago the bank clearings amounted to \$1,175,374, the excess over normal of about \$200,000 being due chiefly to the change of ownership of the Uncle Sam and Carson monies. In comparison yesterday's clearings aggregated only \$426,141, the week's clearings amounted to \$2,074,359, which is \$742,235 less than the total for the corresponding week of a year ago.

TRIES TO SMUGGLE LETTER.

County Prisoner Makes Vain Attempt to Mail Letter.

The efforts of a county prisoner to smuggle a letter into a mail box yesterday morning while on his way to court was the occasion of a lively scene in the vicinity of the police station. The prisoner was Harry Stockpole, alias Pool, who is accused of holding up the inmates of Dr. Higgins' house a short time ago. Pool was being taken to the city court for a hearing on one of the charges against him, and was accompanied by a deputy. As they passed a mail box near the court Pool suddenly sidestepped and made an effort to quickly slip a letter into the box. Here he tripped him and made a grab for his arm in time to prevent the letter getting inside the box. Rather than let the officer have the letter, Pool began to cram it into his mouth. Here he again failed, for the officer rescued the chucked paper and pocketed it himself.

DASHES INTO VEHICLES.

Runaway Team Hurts a Boy on Main Street.

Main street was the scene of a runaway yesterday afternoon, during which wreckage was strewn for nearly a block, and several persons narrowly escaped serious injury. A boy was hurt, but not seriously. The cause of the damage was a delivery wagon and team belonging to the New York & Utah Paper company. The animals became frightened while standing near Main and South streets, and dashed down the street at a terrific speed. At the crossing of Main and First South a woman who was crossing the street came near being run over, but she was snatched out of the way by a bystander. The excited team, continuing its mad career down the street, dashed into a frail cart belonging to Orson Houghton, a mail carrier. Mr. Houghton's little boy was on the seat, and he was thrown to the pavement, severely injuring his head. He was picked up by pedestrians and carried into the Z. C. M. I. drug store, where his injuries were attended by a doctor.

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
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HEAVY SHEEP LOSSES

Scarcity of Feed and High Winds Destroy Large Percentage of Flocks.

At Pleasant, May 3.—Nearly all of the owners of the sheep herds of this city, who have been with the sheep all or part of the winter, have returned today again after their long vigil. They almost unanimously say that the winter has been one of the hardest on the flocks known for some years. There was a scarcity of feed during the earlier part of the season, from which heavy losses resulted, and during March there was a continued high wind which was very cold and which did much damage. Some of the owners say that the losses this winter were as high as 20 per cent of the entire number. They say that the percentage is a little lower, and say it will be about 15 per cent. This is a heavy loss, though. The sheep are now in the range, and are being fed by the thousands, as the owners wish to get them onto the lambing grounds as soon as possible. Feeds are plentiful, and there will be losses during the lambing period, as the snow on the mountains is so high that there is no place for the herds to get above the cultivated and fenced areas.
