

GIVES ADVICE TO GRADUATES University Students Addressed By Bishop Whitney.

TALKS OF PROBLEMS OF LIFE SUGGESTS METHODS BY WHICH SUCCESS CAN BE ATTAINED.

BISHOP Orson F. Whitney delivered the baccalaureate sermon to the graduates of the University of Utah last evening at the Assembly hall.

The bishop began his address in a humorous vein, relating the story of one of George Washington's slaves, who was a school trustee who was to deliver an address at a certain high school commencement, and discovered, upon arising to speak, that he had left his manuscript at home.

The bishop had not forgotten this manuscript, he said, but he intended to follow his advice—not immediately. For knowledge cannot come in a day.

Should Heed Counsel. "I got my limited knowledge in youth by hard knocks, and added to it as best I could afterwards by heeding counsel; not by listening, or trying to listen, but by doing, to wit, by baccalaureate sermon on a hot sticky day in June," declared Bishop Whitney.

Faithful, steady, conscientious labor is the keystone to all success, the bishop maintained. The thinkers may govern those who toil, but the thinkers must be toilers, too.

There is no problem in American society, outside of those relating to life and death," continued Bishop Whitney, "that presses more to the front or cries out more loudly for resolution than the hired help question.

Whoever will convince those who need convincing that there is nothing degrading in the occupation of cooking and housekeeping, that they are just as honorable as bookkeeping, typewriting and stumping—thereby increasing the supply of competent domestic employees, and ending to the reign of terror resulting from the concentration of power in the hands of a dominant few—whenever will lead us through this Red Sea bondage to where we can revise that commandment so as to read: 'Thou shalt not covet thy neighbors' hired help, and 'Thou shalt not oppress thy employer,' will deserve and receive the thanks of 70,000,000 people, and will cause his or her name to live as long and be as gratefully remembered as that of the author of the Declaration of Independence.

Lord laughter greeted the speaker's remarks on the hired help question. Bishop Whitney continued, more seriously, by showing what work means, that it is not always manual labor. He exhorted the students to discover what they were intended for, and to go into it for progress.

Your intended expects you to come after her, do so," he said. He defined true greatness as largeness and goodness of heart, and of innate nobility, not offhending. The Savior is the most perfect pattern of greatness the world has ever known, he said, and in conclusion he exhorted the students to let nothing shake their faith in him.
