



TANDEM "PROS" MAKE GOOD TIME

Two-mile Handicap Won in Blanket Finish. CHAPMAN'S RECORD TRIAL MISSES TURVILLE'S MARK BY NARROW MARGIN.

Official Handicapper J. N. Sharp hit the right marks when he placed the four tandem teams in the two-mile race at the saucer last night, with the result that one of the best races of the year was witnessed. The several teams failed to catch the two leading teams until the sixth lap on the last mile, when a most exciting finish occurred. Samuelson and Chapman had the necessary sprint after their long grid and hit the tape winners by inches in a blanket finish.

The mile record trial by Johnnie Chapman, paced by Barney Oldfield's motor, was regulated in 1:33.8, not quite equaling the track record of 1:31.2, made by Charlie Turville last summer. Chapman sold afterwards that he could have gone faster if the big sputtering machine had been able to keep going. The five-mile amateur lap race brought out seven starters, five of whom finished. Strange to say, there were no falls with this number of amateurs on the track, although Jack Hume and Redman and Hoffer made a fighting race. Hume's chain broke and put the charged lead out of the race. Houghton and Hoffer made a fighting race, the first giving Hume a narrow margin.

Two heats and a final in the half-mile amateur handicap resulted disastrously for the scratch for the first time. Houghton and Herman, all distance men, made the fight for the finish, which was taken by Redman by half a wheel.

HIGHWAY ROBBERY CHARGED. Pullman Porter Arrested in San Francisco.

J. L. Buckner, a Pullman porter, has been arrested in San Francisco on the charge of highway robbery committed at Ogden early Sunday morning. He will be returned to Ogden for trial. The complaint on which the arrest was made was sworn by a San Francisco, a Southern Pacific detective. The facts in the case are about as follows: Among the passengers on the Union Pacific train arriving in Ogden Sunday morning was Mrs. Manney, on her way to San Francisco. Buckner, who was porter on the same train, "Pullman tourist car 1,088, volunteered to show her the Southern Pacific train. Instead of doing so, he took her across the yards to an empty No. 1 Grande Western car. What his real intentions were it is difficult to say, but when he found a car cleaner in the car he disappeared, carrying the lady's satchel with him. Later the satchel was found empty near the Oregon Short Line "Y" her money, \$20, and ticket having been taken. The matter was reported to the Ogden police, who immediately set out on their destination and wired San Francisco for Buckner's arrest.

MRS. WATTIS DEAD. Follows Husband to Grave Within a Year.

Mrs. Addie Viola Wattis, wife of the late George Lyman Wattis, died last evening at her home, 2225 Grant avenue. Some three weeks ago the social manager of the city, Mrs. Wattis, was found lying prostrate on the floor in an unconscious condition, the result of a stroke of apoplexy. A second stroke occurred some two weeks ago, and she has since been in bed. Her husband, who was a brother of W. L. Wattis of The Herald, now in California, died in the city about eleven months ago. Mrs. Wattis had lived in Utah and came to Ogden last August. She leaves three daughters, Myrtle, age 20; Belle, aged 18, and Metta, aged 12 years. The funeral services will be held on Thursday.

IS ARCHDUKE DEAD? Disappearance of Emperor's Nephew Still Remains a Mystery.

New York, June 10.—C. P. Wyche of Washington, superintendent of a dredging company, with offices in this city, has in his possession, according to the Herald, a letter which would appear to prove almost beyond doubt that Archduke John, nephew of the emperor of Austria, who mysteriously disappeared in 1890, while on a voyage to South American waters, lost his life at sea. For twelve years stories that the archduke was still alive have come from various parts of the world. In 1887 an irreconcilable quarrel occurred between the emperor and his nephew, who was imperial archduke of Russia, royal prince of Hungary and grand duke of Tuscany. The dispute was derived of all his offices. His rank as a soldier was taken from him, his name was stricken from the army list and he was forbidden to appear at court—this despite the fact that no one more than his imperial uncle admired his talents and force of character.

Mother Still Thinks He Is Alive. Efforts of friends to settle the quarrel at court, but the archduke, assuming the name of Johann Orth, bought a vessel in England, assumed command, and with his wife, sailed for America. He was reported at Escondido, near Buenos Ayres, and never has been heard from since. Nevertheless recurrent reports that Johann Orth still lives have, it is said, buoyed up the aged archduke in a Tuscan castle, and she never has believed her son to be dead.

IS ARCHDUKE DEAD? Disappearance of Emperor's Nephew Still Remains a Mystery.

New York, June 10.—C. P. Wyche of Washington, superintendent of a dredging company, with offices in this city, has in his possession, according to the Herald, a letter which would appear to prove almost beyond doubt that Archduke John, nephew of the emperor of Austria, who mysteriously disappeared in 1890, while on a voyage to South American waters, lost his life at sea. For twelve years stories that the archduke was still alive have come from various parts of the world. In 1887 an irreconcilable quarrel occurred between the emperor and his nephew, who was imperial archduke of Russia, royal prince of Hungary and grand duke of Tuscany. The dispute was derived of all his offices. His rank as a soldier was taken from him, his name was stricken from the army list and he was forbidden to appear at court—this despite the fact that no one more than his imperial uncle admired his talents and force of character.

Mother Still Thinks He Is Alive. Efforts of friends to settle the quarrel at court, but the archduke, assuming the name of Johann Orth, bought a vessel in England, assumed command, and with his wife, sailed for America. He was reported at Escondido, near Buenos Ayres, and never has been heard from since. Nevertheless recurrent reports that Johann Orth still lives have, it is said, buoyed up the aged archduke in a Tuscan castle, and she never has believed her son to be dead.
