METHODS OF TEACHING.

Professor O'Shea Continues Lectures Before University Summer School.

Professor O'Shea's lecture yesterday morning before the students and patrons of the University of Utah summer school, was the first of two upon the subject of "The Learning Process."

The learning process can best be seen in observing the development of the child's mind. The first stages of learning are the gaining of isolated facts regarding the world outside, the unification of these impressions into family groups, and the making of a general concept.

The evening lecture was upon the subject of "Punishment." After calling attention to the significance of this subject, the speaker dwelt upon the need for punishment, and the manner of its application.

INDIANS MAY VOTE.

Mr. Breeden Renders Opinion Upon Agent Myton's Report.

In response to a query by Indian Agent H. P. Myton of the White Rock agency, Attorney General Breeden yesterday rendered an opinion that a native-born Indian is a citizen and a qualified voter in the state of Utah.

In rendering the opinion, Attorney General Breeden states that the Indian can vote if he has complied with section 1 of the constitution of the state, which reads: "Every citizen of the United States of the age of 21 years and upwards, who shall have been a citizen for ninety days and shall have resided in the state for one year, in the county four months and in the precinct sixty days, next preceding any election, shall be entitled to vote at such election," etc.
