



SKIP THROUGH LINES

Ladrones Chiefs as Smooth as Tracy.

EVADE THE CONSTABULARY

Force Their Way Through Weak Spot in Cordon Near Dasames, Luzon, Killing One and Wounding One of Constabulary and Escaping to Mountains—An Extensive Drive With Object of Capturing Them Had Been Organized in Cavite—Aided by Entire Male Population.

Manila, July 22.—Montallon and Felizardo, the ladrones chiefs, have broken through the constabulary cordon in Cavite province and have escaped to the mountains.

The cordon encompassed the leaders and many of their followers. The latter, when trapped, made a series of breaks to escape. The constabulary broke the first attacks, killing fourteen and capturing fifteen men.

BREAK THROUGH CORDON.

The ladrones finally massed under cover of the darkness and forced their way through a weak spot in the cordon, near Dasames, killing one and wounding one of the constabulary. The latter captured the papers and effects of the leaders and destroyed quantities of supplies.

EXTENSIVE DRIVE ORGANIZED.

An extensive drive, with the object of capturing the ladrones chiefs, Montallon and Felizardo, and fifty of their followers, was organized in Cavite province. Twelve hundred constabulary, commanded by Capt. Baker, moved last Thursday at daylight, forming a complete angle-shaped cordon, covering sixty square miles. Patrol launches guarded the rivers and it was expected to close the cordon last Saturday. The entire male population of the towns and farms were to be included in the concentration movement. When complete, the ladrones were to have been arrested and the others were to have been released.

FINDING IN GLENN CASE.

Major Found Guilty Administering Water Cure to Natives.

Washington, July 22.—Secretary Root today sent to the President at Oyster Bay the proceedings and findings in the court-martial cases of Major Edwin Edwin F. Glenn, Fifth infantry, Lieut. Julien E. Gaufof, Tenth cavalry, and Lieut. Norman E. Cook of the Philippine scouts. Glenn was found guilty of administering the water cure to natives, or permitting it to be done, and was sentenced to one month's suspension from duty and fined \$50. Lieut. Cook was acquitted on a charge of giving orders to kill three Filipino prisoners. The testimony showed that he had given orders to shoot the prisoners if they attempted to escape. The Filipino scouts to whom this order was given thought it meant to shoot the prisoners.

In forwarding the cases to the President, the Secretary recommends that the sentences and findings be approved, but that no other action shall be taken. It is not believed that the President, who is the reviewing authority in these cases, will make any comments such as were delivered by him in the case of Smith. It is shown in the evidence and reports that Major Glenn has performed excellent service and has done much to pacify the country where he has been in command.

START FOR YELLOWSTONE.

Fifty Tourists From Des Moines Leave St. Anthony for Park.

St. Anthony, Ida., July 22.—A party of fifty tourists and students from Des Moines, Ia., started from here for the Yellowstone park, in conveyances provided by Yager & Son, for a three weeks' trip. To handle this party it required eleven spring wagons and five heavy farm wagons to carry the camp equipment and supplies. This is one of the many parties which arrive here each year and outfit for the park.

Tomorrow there will be another party of fifteen, the members of which are from the vicinity of Salina, Utah, two of the number being local agents of the Rio Grande Western, also the President's minister from that place.

The gentleman in charge of the party from Des Moines says he will return again next year with three different parties to visit the scenes along the Snake river and surrounding country.

GOSSIP IN LONDON TOWN.

King Edward will visit the Czar in the latter part of September. Delay in making arrangements for carrying out the Rhodes bequests for Oxford scholarships is caused by the difficulty of effecting a financial settlement under the will.

Reconstruction of the British Cabinet remains a pressing matter for the cabinet managers. Mr. Brodrick has been added to the string, trotted out for the Treasury vacancy.

Immediately after the coronation Queen Alexandra goes to Denmark to join her sister, the Dowager Marina, the King following about September 1st. The King and Queen will go to St. Petersburg after a two weeks' stay in Denmark.

No important result has been accomplished by the imperial conference, which resumed its session yesterday. The King's illness and Colonial Secretary Chamberlain's accident have been obstacles to the development of enthusiasm over the work.

Mr. and Mrs. Whitlaw Reid returned to London yesterday after a tour of Scotland. Mr. Reid went by rail, meeting the minister of his party at Skibo castle, Scotland, the seat of Andrew Carnegie, to which they had journeyed from London in an automobile.

King Edward will hold his first council since A. J. Balfour became Premier on board the royal yacht shortly. It is expected that the new Lord-Lieutenant of Ireland to succeed Earl Cadogan, whose resignation was made public July 12th, will then be announced.

The Metropolitan Fire brigade is receiving some hard knocks on the hands of the boys engaged in the quest upon the victims of the recent fire in Queen Victoria street, when nine young girls were injured because the ladders were too short to reach the fourth story.

TOLD BY CABLE.

Bishop O'Gorman will sail for the United States next week. He will bring with him a letter from Cardinal Rampolla to Secretary Hay.

James McNeil Whistler, the American painter, has telegraphed to his friends in London that he has practically recovered from his recent illness.

Mr. Mayor Pughan of San Francisco has sent to John Redmond, chairman of the National parliamentary party, 500 pounds as a contribution to the National fund.

Land owners have formed a committee with a capital of 100,000 to protect themselves against the "landed Irish" agents. The prospect of the combination makes the complaint that the Government has failed to afford the land owners adequate assistance.
