UTAH LAKE RESERVOIR FIRST PROJECT IN STATE

Only Suggested Barrier Will Be the Litigation Pending Between Canal Companies.

Chief Engineer Newell Talks Entertainingly at Reception Given in His Honor by Commercial Club.

FROM PERSONAL conversation and the drift of an address made before the Commercial club last night by F. H. Newell, chief engineer of the reclamation survey, it is reasonably certain that the first government irrigation project in Utah will be the utilization of Utah lake as a great reservoir.

water supply, each land owner agreeing to pay his pro rata share. Mr. Newell was asked how the law could be made operative where there is litigation between counties and between canals in different counties, such as has been the case in the past.

Over \$5,000,000 Available. Mr. Newell said the government had between \$5,000,000 and \$5,000,000 available now for irrigation purposes from the sale of public lands.

Working of Survey. Mr. Newell prefaced his talk by describing the workings of the geological survey of the interior department, which was entrusted with the execution of the reclamation law.

Mr. Newell said that the geological survey, he said, to examine and report to the secretary of the interior on projects for the reclamation of arid lands. No project would be considered which did not promise to refund its cost to the government ultimately.
