FARMERS ASK RAILROAD TO PAY FOR CROPS DAMAGED.

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MEETS ALL CUTS.

Santa Fe Road Leads Its Rivals a Lively Race.

The Santa Fe is keeping its rivals guessing. It has taken a lead in reducing freight rates, and some of its sharpest competitors have hesitated to follow it in this movement.

Two weeks ago it promised to make a reduction in the shipping rates affecting structural iron and mining machinery. A rate was announced yesterday on mining machinery which will become effective at once.

The rate between Denver and this city was increased according to schedule, but the rate from Chicago and the Mississippi to common points in Colorado was reduced.
