

BIG FIGHT FOR EMPTY HONORS

Republican Clans Gathering at Idaho's Capital.

WIRE PULLERS ALL ON HAND

SENATORIAL CANDIDATES TAKING AN ACTIVE PART.

(Special to The Herald.) BOISE, Aug. 18.—The Republican clans are gathering for the state convention, to be held next Wednesday.

Several delegates have already been named by candidates. John T. Morrison of Canyon county, candidate for the governorship, has opened headquarters at the Overland Hotel.

W. E. Fletcher of Nez Perce, another candidate for governor, has opened headquarters at the Idahoan. Mr. French is expected in this evening with the delegation.

W. E. Beale of Shoshone, candidate for congress, has headquarters at Idahoan. Dr. Steeley arrived this evening. The state central committee has opened headquarters at the Idahoan.

Forces Lining Up. The gossip of the day revolves largely around the governorship. There are three candidates in the field, and it is felt one of them will receive the nomination.

Rome, Aug. 18.—The Buenos Ayres correspondent of the Secolo cables that further news has been received there of the Nordenskjold antarctic expedition. The vessel is impoverished in ice and preparations have been commenced to proceed to another port. The health of the members of the party was excellent.

The expedition is headed by Prof. Otto Nordenskjold, nephew of Baron Nordenskjold, who died Aug. 12, 1901. It sailed from Gothenburg, Sweden, on the steamer Antarctic, Oct. 18, 1901.

The first news of the expedition was received at Montevideo, Snow Hill, Louis Philippe land.

FIFTEEN YEARS IN THE PEN. Little Mercy Was Shown to Frank C. Andrews.

Detroit, Mich., Aug. 18.—Judge Murphy, in the recorder's court today, sentenced Frank C. Andrews, who was found guilty Saturday of misappropriating funds of the City Savings bank, to 15 years at hard labor in Jackson prison. He had previously refused to grant Andrews bail pending the settlement of the bill of exceptions that his attorneys will file.

LATE HAWAIIAN NEWS

Primaries of the Republican Party Held—Fears for Safety of the Bark Caylon.

Honolulu, Aug. 5, (via San Francisco, Aug. 18).—The Republican party held primaries throughout the territory last Saturday afternoon and evening. The vote was extraordinarily large, having increased 100 per cent on the island of Oahu. It is thought, however, that a large number of natives who are not Republicans, voted.

The election was a very quiet one, there being few contests in Honolulu. The Republican territorial convention will be held in Honolulu on Sept. 1.

A contest has been begun in the circuit court over the right of the court of Chinatown to receive a charge fees from the 6,700 claimants whose cases were heard and adjudicated. In the court of Chinatown, Judge Goss announced his opinion that the whole act creating the commission is unconstitutional. The commission made awards of about a million and a half, for which warrants are made out ready for issuance, but there is no money to pay them. The fees charged to claimants aggregated \$25,000 for certificates of award, and one firm of attorneys, who paid \$12, are contesting the matter.

The complaint sets out that the house of the plaintiff, which adjoins that of the defendant's store, was damaged to the extent of \$1,000 by the explosion.

DAMAGES FOR ARREST SPARED FROM ARREST

Deputy Sheriff Sued for \$1,500 by Miss Hassard—Proceedings in District Court.

Caroline N. A. Hassard, the young woman who, on July 12, "stuck up" Deputy Sheriff Arthur P. Cummings, when he tried to take possession of several horses at the Hassard home, in Riverton, yesterday brought an action for \$1,500 damages against the deputy sheriff. In the complaint, which was filed in the district court, Miss Hassard accuses the defendant of unlawfully assaulting and arresting her and confining her in the county jail for five days.

REMAINED UNCONSCIOUS. Clifford Spicer, Who Met With Accident, Dies at Monroe.

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

BOOK COMPANY IN TROUBLE. Kansas Labor Unions Charge Use of Unfair Means.

Topeka, Kan., Aug. 18.—The labor unions of Topeka have filed suit against the American Book company to prevent the company from carrying out its contract to supply the schools of Kansas with text-books. The unions allege that the company used unfair means in securing the contract, and that it is organized in opposition to the anti-trust law. The probate court issued an injunction against the company, to hold until the district court could pass on the matter. The injunction granted by the federal court to restrain Crane & Co. from further interfering with the company will not apply in this case.
