Venezuelan Rebels Made Vicious Attack on Carupano.

FINALLY MET WITH DEFEAT

COLOMBIA HAS A BONE TO PICK WITH NICARAGUA.

KINGSTON, Aug. 29.—The German steamer Polaria, which arrived here today from Venezuelan ports last Friday, Aug. 22, reports that while at Carupano, Venezuela, 700 rebels attacked the place stubbornly and got inside the town, where they were met by 1000 government troops under General Vial.

A dispatch to the Associated Press from Willemstad, island of Curacao, Monday, Aug. 25, announced that details had been received there of the occupation of the port of Carupano, Venezuela, by the Venezuelan government forces.

O'BRIEN RELEASED ON FIVE THOUSAND BAIL

Washington, Aug. 29.—Richard T. O'Brien, formerly corporal in the Twenty-sixth infantry, who has been confined in jail here accused of burglary, on account of his testimony before the senate Philippine commission during the last session of congress, was arraigned today before Justice Anderson. He pleads not guilty and was released on \$5,000 bail.

STRIKE BREWING.

Topeka, Kan., Aug. 29.—Santa Fe officials here have been notified that another strike is brewing among the Santa Fe bellmen at San Bernardino, Cal. The men claim, it is understood, that the road is not keeping the agreement made at the settlement of the former strike and that it has blacklisted two of the strikers.

NO STRIKE IN KANSAS.

Pittsburg, Kan., Aug. 29.—There will be no strike among the miners of Kansas this fall, despite general expectations. There is a disposition on the part of all the miners to accept the terms made by their committee with the operators. Only three companies in the district have refused to sign the scale for next year.

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ANNEXATION TO UNITED STATES

Jamaica and Trinidad Tired of British Colonial Rule.
