

ANDERSON PLANS LITTLE SCHEME

Will Have Speakers Follow Judge King.

A GREAT PURSUIT RACE

DEMOCRATIC OUTLOOK IMPROVES EACH DAY.

COUNTY Commissioner James H. Anderson, chairman of the Republican state committee, does not propose to take the least notice of the two challenges which he has received from the Democrats.

Although Chairman Anderson refuses to recognize the two challenges, he does propose to take notice of the plans of the Democrats whereby they intend to have Judge William H. King follow Joseph Howell throughout the state on his stumping tour.

The information was given out yesterday at Republican headquarters that Judge Theo. Botkin of Salt Lake and Joseph Odell of Logan will follow Judge King the same as the latter proposes to dog the footsteps of Joseph Howell as he stumps the state.

Last evening the Republican congressional nominee opened the campaign at his home in Wellsville. On the platform with him was Congressman Sutherland. This evening Joseph Howell will speak at Brigham City. While he is talking there, Judge King will be discussing the issues of the day and the refusal of the g. o. p. congressional candidate to meet him on the same platform at Wellsville.

DEMOCRATIC OUTLOOK.

Iowa National Committeeman Discusses the Outlook.

Democratic National Committeeman J. J. Richardson of Iowa, who is registered at the Klatsford hotel, spent some time yesterday in consultation with Chairman Frank J. Cannon. He expressed himself as more than pleased with the outlook for the Democratic party throughout the county this fall.

Precinct Convention.

At a convention last evening of the delegates to the Democratic county convention from the Salt Lake City precinct, who met in a district court room in the city, Judge C. M. Nielsen of the Third district was nominated by acclamation for justice of the peace, and on the first ballot Brigham Y. Goding of the First precinct was selected as the nominee for constable.

Judge E. A. Wilson was made chairman of the meeting, John Arnpup secretary, John Green sergeant-at-arms, H. S. Steator reading clerk. The first order of business was the selection of a justice of the peace. James H. McQuinn of the Third district was nominated by acclamation. As he was the only candidate, his nomination was made unanimously.

Political Notes.

Letters from prominent Democrats are being received at headquarters which indicate that interest is being taken in the campaign throughout the state. They are full of enthusiasm, indicating that the Democrats have entered the fight this fall with a determination to win. There is a strong demand for a clamor for political literature.

TOOLE AND SEVIER REUBLI-CANS MEET.

M. PLEASANT, Sept. 30.—In marked contrast to the Republican convention held at Spring City a week ago, in which contention and turmoil predominated, was the Democratic county convention held here yesterday.

Enthusiasm ran high throughout the day, and harmony prevailed from the beginning to the end. The nominations were made by acclamation. The few contests that were made in the best of good nature and the defeated aspirant took his defeat without a murmur of disapproval.

The certificate of nomination of B. R. McDonald, Republican candidate for the state senate from the Twelfth senatorial district, was filed yesterday with the secretary of state.

After the election it is not the purpose of the Democrats to permit their city and county organization to go to pieces. It will be maintained throughout the year by the selection of some prominent Democrat whose sole duty it will be to look after the interests of the party by keeping the organizations intact.

Chairman Anderson yesterday afternoon issued a call for a special meeting Saturday afternoon at 4 o'clock of the Republican state committee. The most important business will be the mapping out of an itinerary for Joseph Howell.

John Seaman of Ogden was in the city yesterday. He was much pleased with the Democratic county ticket and predicted success.

Judge S. R. Thurman of Provo was yesterday hobnobbing with the politicians in regard to the Democratic victory throughout the state this fall written upon the cards.

HIGHEST MINDS ATTRACTED

COMMUNICATION FROM A PROMINENT LAWYER.

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo., Sept. 30.—The committees in charge of the arrangements for the tenth national irrigation congress, which convenes here Oct. 6, have received encouraging reports which promise a large attendance of noted men from all parts of the country. Large delegations from the commercial clubs of Omaha and St. Paul will come in private cars. New Mexico, Texas, Wyoming, Kansas and Nebraska cities will also send large delegations. The subjects to be handled, affecting as they do the proper expenditure of \$3,000,000 of public money now available and the proceeds from future land sales for the reclamation of millions of arid acres and the making of homes for millions of people now crowded in the cities, have attracted the highest minds of the nation from captains of industry to the leaders of the labor organizations. Letters of endorsement of the possibilities of the congress are pouring in every day from these people.

FINISHED THEIR WORK

Senate Committee Probably Sailed From Honolulu For Home Last Monday.

(Correspondence of the Associated Press.) Honolulu, Sept. 24.—The sub-committee of the senate committee on Pacific islands and Porto Rico has had a very busy week. On the island of Hawaii they devoted two days to public hearings at Hilo and one at Mountain View. The principal matters presented to them were testimony regarding the Hawaiian land laws; the public improvement of the harbor of Hilo, particularly harbor improvements at Hilo, and light houses at various points on the coast; and the subject of compensation to the ex-queen for the loss of the crown lands.

Constantinople, Sept. 30.—Diplomatic circles here do not regard the situation in Macedonia as being so serious as would appear from the Turkish government's military preparations in calling out 40,000 men of the militia reserves. The port's alarm is partially attributed to the maneuvers and other incidents of the Shipka Pass fetes, the political importance of which, however, is considered to have been greatly exaggerated, in view of the approach of the winter, when the movements will necessarily be stopped. It is not thought that the threats of the Macedonian committee will foment a general revolution or develop into anything very serious.

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ASKED TO RESIGN.

London, Sept. 30.—The members of the United Irish League of Donel county have passed a resolution demanding the resignation of William O'Doherty, who represents that seat in the house of commons, because he attended the coronation of King Edward in Westminster Abbey. Mr. O'Doherty, in his reply, declared that he intended to resign and condemn the separation policy of the Irish nationalists as impractic
