IN THE DIVORCE COURT.

Testimony in Roscamp Case to Be Taken by Referee. Before Judge Hall the case of Thoma Roscamp against his wife, Henrietta Roscamp, for divorce, was heard yesterday and referred to G. A. Armstrong of the county clerk's office, to take the testimony and report the same subject to a withdrawal of the reference if the parties so desire. Several charges were made in the suit for divorce which was begun by Roscamp against his wife, who, in her answer, charged habitual drunkenness and cruelty on his part. Numerous amended complaints were filed by both parties, and the plaintiff asked permission to file another yesterday. Permission was granted, and the reference was later withdrawn. All witnesses were excluded from the room during the testimony.
