

NEW SHOPS OF UNION PACIFIC

Improvement Is Being Made in the Rolling Stock. FULL EQUIPMENT OF MEN

SINCE the completion and the operation of the new Union Pacific shops at Omaha, a noticeable improvement is observed in the management of the rolling stock. These shops, which were opened about ten days ago, are the finest shops of the kind in the world.

TROLLEY CAR ACCIDENT

Two Persons Killed and Six Injured at One of the Death Corners in Kansas City.

Kansas City, Nov. 4.—A heavily loaded trolley car on the Broadway line jumped the track today at Fifth and Broadway and crashed into a saloon. Two persons, a woman and a negro, were killed and six others were injured.

AN IMPORTANT DECISION.

Points Involved in the Great Northern-Western Union Fight. St. Paul, Nov. 4.—In the decision handed down yesterday by Judge Thayer of the United States circuit court of appeals, in which the Great Northern was victorious in the suit to cut the Western Union Telegraph company from the railroad's right of way, the decision holds that the contention of the Great Northern Railway company in this instance meant little less than a complete victory.

The circuit court of appeals also further holds that the contract which the telegraph company has with the Great Northern was and is in perpetuity of way and not to be disrupted, but it is allowed that the railway company is entitled to the cost of transporting any and all material which the telegraph company uses in the construction of its lines.

Statement Presented to the Coal Strike Commission.

PLEA FOR INCREASED WAGES

LESS HOURS OF WORK AND FAIR MEASUREMENT.

HAZLETON, Pa., Nov. 4.—The statement of the anthracite mine workers' case, which was filed with the strike commission on Sunday night, was made public today. Copies of the statement have been furnished to the operators, who will reply in three or four days.

"The present rate of wages is lower than is paid in other occupations requiring equal skill and training. The average annual earnings in the anthracite coal fields are much less than the average annual earnings in the bituminous coal fields for substantially similar work.

PHILIPPINE ISLANDS

Manila, Nov. 4.—The Philippine commissioners have taken firm measures to prevent the rice famine which is threatening Manila. The commission has appropriated \$5,000,000 (Mexican) for the purchase and transportation of rice to be sold to the sufferers at a cash price covering the cost.
